THEATRICAL.—A large and appreciative audience filled the Theatre last evening to witness the first representation of Offenbach's popular burlesque opera of La grande Duchesse, by the Howson Opera and Burlesque Troupe. They fully sustained the reputation that had preceded them. Miss Emma Howson, in the title role, La grande Duchesse, was indubitably the singing star of the evening. We have never had the pleasure of listening to Miss Clelia Howson, as Wanda, did remarkably well, her by-play being very good, especially in the first act, when the Duchess raised her sweet heart, Fritz, from the lowest to the highest post of honor in her army. Messrs. E. A. Howson and J. Jerome, as Fritz and Gen. Roum, sustained their characters in a very creditable manner. Mr. Margetts enacted the part of Baron Puck to the thorough satisfaction of all. The other characters were well sustained. At the end of the first act they were called before the curtain. On the whole the opera was a success, and we may venture to say that to-night another large house will greet the company on the second representation of this opera.

THE SAINTS IN WALES.—We learn by the *Millennial Star* that a conference of the Saints in Wales was held on the 2nd ult., at Merthyr, at which President A. Carrington, and Elders E. Morris, N. Pratt, J. S. Lewis and L. W. Richards, from Utah, were present. Elder Morris, President of the Welsh District, reported the Church in the principality in a prosperous condition, the Saints living up to their duties, and using every means within their power to emigrate. This district is now divided into five conferences and numbers 1,500 members.

THE FIRST OF JUNE.—This day is memorable as the birthday of President Brigham Young. He was born sixty-eight years ago to-day in the town of Whitingham, Windham County, Vermont. He is one of six brothers, five of whom are now living in this city. The youngest, Lorenzo D. was sixty-one years old last October, and the eldest, President John Young, commemorated his seventy-ninth birthday by having a family party, at which all the brothers were present, on the 22nd ult. President Young is a descendant of families noted for their longevity. On his father's side there is not so much known about the family, as his grandfather, who was a physician and surgeon in the French and Indian war, was accidentally killed when his father was but about four years old; but his father was in his seventy-seventh year when he died, and under most favorable circumstances he might have lived much longer, for his death was hastened by the exposure and sufferings which he endured in being driven by mob violence from the State of Missouri. It grieved his soul to think that he could not enjoy liberty in that land, the government of which he had fought to establish and maintain. On the President's mother's side the Howes and Goodards are long-lived people.

There is not a man on the continent for the prolongation of whose life so many heartfelt, sincere prayers are offered as President Brigham Young. All hope and pray that he may long live to lead and guide Israel, whom he has been the instrument in the hands of God of bringing to these mountains, and whose energies and labors he has organized and directed until they have reached their present happy and prosperous condition. It has fallen to the lot of but few men in any age to perform so glorious a work, so free from errors, mistakes and blots, as he has been the means in the hands of the Lord of accomplishing. The blessings of thousands of happy souls, happy because, under his administration, they have been redeemed from the thralldom of adverse circumstances and the greater thralldom of all—bigotry and error—rest upon him. But greater than these is the consciousness that the blessings of the Great Supreme have rested upon him, his counsels and his labors.
