CONGRESSIONAL.

HOUSE.
WASHINGTON, 15.—Hurd, from the Judiciary committee, reported a resolution in the habeas corpus case of *Millburn*, directing the Sergeant-at-Arms to make a careful return to the writ, setting out the reasons of the detention of *Millburn*, and to retain the custody of his body, and not to produce it before the judge of court without the further order of the House. He proceeded to argue in support of the resolution.
Edward A. Tamm, stated that he had just been informed by the Sergeant-at-Arms that he had appeared before the judge at 10 o'clock according to the order of the House of the case had been postponed till next Tuesday morning; he therefore gave notice that he would call the question on Monday, at 10 o'clock.

EASTERN.
BOSTON, 15.—The *Telegraph* has been informed that the London correspondent mentions a rumor of the intended establishment of a new line of steamships between New York and London, and says it is not a stock jobbing story, and that a Downing street official, when questioned about it, said the project was not yet definite, because such a recognition of Egypt would be a direct insult to England's traditional ally, Turkey; but he added that it was not impossible to Diarrell's scheme of policy.

The parties to whom Stewart left legacies of thousands of dollars, or less, rather than his wife's relations, are chiefly attorneys, accountants, or other business employees of her estate. The project generally voices public surprise at the character of the will. The *Telegraph* says that Stewart, who baffled inquiries during his life time, has admitted that he had his death; he has done none of the secret of different things expected of him, he has neither given a hint of his plans, nor has he been able to perform his duty in any other public purpose, nor left it entirely to his family; he has simply disposed of it at will. It was his boast that his estate transactions were regulated by the most exact system, and that not a man in his establishment was allowed to use his own discretion; but he left fifty millions at least to be disposed of according to a more understanding of what his wishes would be if he had the task to perform himself. Nothing in Stewart's career is half as strange as this will; it contradicts his whole life. There is nothing in his life to suggest that he had any unexplained designs of beneficence were on a large scale or a small one, whether they called for thousands or millions.

The *Times* says the prevailing sentiment in regard to the provisions of the will is one of "disappointment." The will is not a perfectly natural one. It is not more than once in a century one can expect to see accurately within a single life so vast a fortune as that which Stewart possessed. What boundless opportunities for well-doing presented themselves to the man who possessed a small portion of such a sum, and that not within the limited area of public charities so much as in the field of social and scientific endeavor, in plans for elevating the fallen, educating public morality, instilling good habits and cultivating respect, whereby the people might be raised above the level of social outcasts, and kept from sinking to the level of the brute. It is not surprising that the will will persist in thinking of the noble contribution Stewart might have made to any or all of these ends.

Just as they will regret in his last will that he intended to leave his intentions in a nebulous condition. The Woman's Home and the Homeopathic experiment are, so far as known, the only enterprises begun by Stewart which should be ranked as plans for the welfare of our fellow beings. So far as his direct instructions go, however, the will is a mere mass of fortune passed to his widow, without any conditions whatever as to its future disposal. A man as great as Stewart was, and who there will still exist misgivings about the material and social development of this country did right in giving up for the sake of others a little of his substance in return. There are perfectly estimable persons who live and die without the slightest conception of the meaning of the spirit. Stewart's mind had evidently become too much subdued to what he worked in, to be able to respond to a demand of kind or localized patriotism in a way at all equal to his opportunities. It is true that Stewart has honored womanhood by the bestowal of his widow; he has displayed in the direction of his widow; he has bestowed one of the most splendid rewards ever granted to faithful and devoted service in his bequest to Judge Hilton; he has remembered with princely liberality the devotion to his wife's welfare which helped to guide the complicated mechanism of his business, and two of the friends of his early days have shared his bounty in a generous manner; but many will compare the work of a moderate fortune like that of Peter Cooper with that of men of untold resources like Stewart, and will regret that he has given the city to which he owes so much some of the best of his money in a way that will not be remembered by the city.

Judge Hilton says that Stewart displayed almsgiving, preferring to assist people to maintain themselves by their own industry. Hilton intimates that the widow's actions will indicate the husband's ideas as to the best method of aiding charitable enterprises.

The *Express* objects to the criticisms of Stewart's will, and encourages him with questioning that the old man was hurt by him. It was because he was weaker and bolder than others. He was more than a great almsgiver, he was a great merchant and a distinguished business man, and he was fitted for the place in the Cabinet to which Grant invited him. He made a mistake in business he had courage to correct it at any moment. His judgment was good, his courage equal to the occasion whatever it was, and there was no doubt that the European was a man of

The bill passed by the House on Thursday, and now before the President for approval, is the measure that was put through the Senate last January, mainly by the efforts of Senator Sherman. It not only declares that a land grant cannot take effect until the notice of withdrawal is received at the local offices but it also defines the claim of the Pacific Railroad Companies, that in cases of abandonment or incomplete homestead or pre-emption entry, all such entries may, when this bill is signed, be carried to patent. This provision affects very large interests in California.

Pyper's joint resolution directing the Secretary of the Treasury to execute the expiring law relative to cooile emigrants, is now before the committee on commerce, of which he is a member; Pyper says his main purpose in introducing it was to obtain an opportunity, when reporting it back, to add the subject prominently before the House for discussion.

MEMPHIS, 15.—The *Appeal*'s Jackson special says the Mississippi legislature adjourned sine die this afternoon.

INSURANCE COMPANIES FETTERED.
NASHVILLE, Tenn., 15.—The Nashville Insurance Co., and the Old Fellows' and Widows' and Orphans' Life Insurance Co., suspended to-day the assets of the first named company are \$250,000, liabilities \$319,000; the assets of the second company are \$208,000, liabilities over \$100,000.

COUNTERFEITERS ARRESTED.
CINCINNATI, 15.—U. S. detectives, to-day, arrested Bill Mills, Roman Leher, David Rohl, and Charles Rieley, counterfeiters; a considerable amount in 50 cent counterfeit notes, and dies for manufacturing nickels were captured.

WHISKEY THIEVES SENTENCED.
ST. LOUIS, Mo., 15.—The following sentences were passed to-day by Judge Kackie, of the U. S. District Court, at Jefferson City, on the persons convicted in this court of connection with the whiskey frauds—John L. Bittiger, co-gauger at St. Joseph, two years in the penitentiary and \$2,000 fine; Simon Adair, and Abraham Furst, distillers and rectifiers at St. Joseph, each one year in the county jail and \$10,000 fine; John C. Sheehan, distiller at St. Joseph, six months in the county jail, and \$2,000 fine; Jas. E. Marsh, ex-gauger of Kansas City, six months in jail and \$1,000 fine.

WHISKEY THIEVES SENT TO JAIL.
In the U. S. Circuit Court, to-day, Judge John M. Krum, made order that the court would delay the commitment in the case of Avery, as a petition had been filed for his release, and that the transfer to some eastern penitentiary. Judge Treat refused to consider the motion unless it came from the District Attorney. Dyer refused to make the motion, saying that Avery could be transferred after commitment as well as before. Accordingly, the commitment in the case of Avery and McDonald were made out, and they started for Jefferson City to-morrow.

MEETING OF CITY COUNCIL.
Chicago, 15.—The common council held a meeting to-night, which closed at a late hour to-night, and after much discussion of the subject declared the recent town election null and void on account of frauds perpetrated, and, by virtue of the power vested in them, appointed the following town officers—Bernard C. Coleman, collector, vice Evans; William Gray, assessor, vice Phillips; Robert Lincoln, supervisor, vice Ryan; and William Carver, vice Gleason. This ends all the trouble, so far as the officers are concerned. The mayor has, as yet, made no response to the written demand by the citizens' committee for his resignation.

FOREIGN.
GREAT BRITAIN.
Trenson and Amhurst.
LONDON, 15.—An Austrian officer of rank recently scandalized Vienna by selling to the Russian Embassy there military plans of the Danube. The Austrian War Office, together with the plans for the mobilization of the army and the concentration of troops at certain points of the frontier, as well in the event of the occupation of Bosnia and Herzegovina, as of war with Russia; the officer was sentenced to death by the Emperor of Austria, the Countess Strachwitz.

THE STOCK AND MONEY MARKET.
On the Stock Exchange there has been excitement in the foreign stock market during the week. The supply of money continues large, and the discount rate in Egypt coupons due this month, although there was a sharp recovery in prices on Thursday, yet the extent of the previous rise was by no means made up, and the week's operations show a serious reduction in prices. Egyptian securities have been indiscriminately sold at from one to eighteen lower. Peruvian from four to six lower, Hungarian from four to five lower, Russian two to three lower, Spanish 2 to 2 1/2 lower, and Turkish 1 to 2 lower. Most of the securities in this department have been quoted at the lowest point ever reached. Consols are dull; British railway shares have been rather heavy in sympathy with foreign markets, but the market has been steady. 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
