FORTY-SEVENTH CONGRESS.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 24.—A bill was

introduced by Cockrell to appoint a

special commission for the promotion

of commercial intercourse with

such countries of South America as

may be found to possess the most

natural and available facilities for

railway communication with each

other, and with the United States.

The Senate passed bills to provide

for the allotment of lands in several-

ty to Indians on various reservations

and extended the protection of the

laws of State and Territories over

the Indians and for other purposes.

On motion of Dawes it was amend-

ed by substituting for the clause ex-

empting lands acquired by Indians

from taxation for twenty years, a

provision declaring the lands al-

lotted for that period, shall be held

by the United States in trust for the

benefit of the allottees or their heirs.

On motion of Plumb the section

appropriating \$100,000 to make sur-

veys and resurveys of reservations

provided for with a view to the al-

lotment of lands in severalty, was

amended to require that the money

be repaid to the Treasury out of the

proceeds of the sale of such lands as

may be acquired from Indians under

the act.

Morgan introduced a bill for the

encouragement of closer commer-

cial relations between the United

States and South American coun-

tries. It proposed holding a conven-

tion in Washington the present year

with a view to the consideration of

a through line of railway along the

eastern slope of the great mountain

chain from Central America to

Chile, and the establishment of

other facilities.

HOUSE.

WASHINGTON, 24.—Robinson de-

sired immediate consideration of a

resolution concerning the imprison-

ment of American citizens and the

matter went over till to-morrow.

By Humphrey, (Wis.) from the

The bill increasing by 100 men the

police force of the District of Colum-

bia and authorizing the commis-

sions per mile or 1,042,614 acres,

but the amount of land actually cer-

tified and patented under the grant is

1,441,000 acres, or 88,746 acres more

than the greatest possible amount

that could rightfully be embraced in

the grant.

For 53 1/2 miles of road the Sioux

City & St. Paul road of Iowa, was

entitled to 559,520 acres at the ut-

most, but 407,910 acres have been

certified to and patented.

The St. Paul & Sioux City road, of

Minnesota, is entitled to 650,000

acres, but has received 1,250,555.

The St. Paul & Pacific road, in

Minnesota, has also received in ex-

cess of the maximum area of its

grant.

The area given to the Ohio Falls

& Sioux City road in Iowa is 25,000

acres in excess of its maximum

grant.

The Winona & St. Peter Com-

pany is credited with an area of 1-

410,000 acres, and it was estimated

that the actual area to which it was

entitled was 710,000 acres.

Smuggling Sugar.

New York, 24.—Collector Robert-

son, of this port, instructed special

agents to make a careful in-

vestigation in regard to recent im-

portations of sugar. It has been re-

ported that certain parties have

been evading paying duty by bring-

ing sugar from the East Indies via

the Hawaiian Islands. After being

taken to the Hawaiian Islands in a

raw state, the sugar is put through
