COAT SUIT FOR FALL.

Styles in coat suits are as the sand is of the sea—numerous. In looking over the new models it is a matter of wonder where all the ideas come from. From the strictly tailor-made suit, as severe in outline as it is possible to make it, the styles run through the various gradations of the most fanciful costume styles. Velvet trimmings, buttons and braids are greatly used and combinations of two colors as well as two materials are seen. Particular attention is given to the trimming and treatment of the back of the coat. The model shown by photograph illustrates this idea. The pleated skirt is of course the vogue, and has been through the summer. The idea of pleats is also being introduced into the body of the coat, back and front. This is owing to the fact that many of the lighter weight materials, such as fancy worsteds and serges are being used in coat suits, and they look better in pleats and tufts than in plain surfaces. Coat suits all have large sleeves with a marked fullness at the shoulder and a close effect from the elbow down. Narrow vests of embroidery are often used. Odd-shaped felt hats, pressed into shape, trimmed with pleated velvet, and sleeping paradise plumes will be worn tipped with the first fall suits.

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
