HOW JAPS DO THINGS.

High Official Traveled as a Menial to Port Arthur.

New York, Feb. 11 .- When informed by his government that the Japanese minister at St. Petersburg was withthe Japanese consul here drawn, chartered a British vessel and went to Port Arthur and Dainy to take off refu-gees, says a Herald dispatch from Chefoo.

He was afforded every facility by the Russian officials at Port Arthur. After leaving Dainy he encountered the Japanese fleet, about 18 miles from Port Arthur.

A high naval Japanese commander had traveled, the correspondent states, as a menial in the consul's train to Port Arthur and noted the exact position of the Russian ships, and also that they had not got steam up, and were not keeping a sharp lookout.

As soon as the Japanese fleet was sighted, signals were exchanged and the Japanese naval officer was taken aboard the flagship. There he made a detailed report of his observances to the admiral. This, the dispatch declases, would account for the accuracy with which the Japanese attack was made.

War in the Far East Sends it

New York, Feb. 11 .- War in the far east already has affected the silk piece goods market of the United States. The majority of prominent importing houses have just announced advances of 10 per cent on Habutai and other slik fabrics manufactured in Japan. They give as their reason the fact that many of the operatives and skilled hands in the various factories have been drafted for war purposes, and their places canno be filled. Stocks in Yokohama and New York are decidedly light.

In order to secure a uniformity of prices the more important Japanese houses in the trade are getting to-gether and endeavoring to establish ar getner and ended only to the regulation of prices, as it is believed that unless some sort of an agreement is made the market is more than likely to be entirely upset as to values. Several of the largest firms already have at tached their names to the agreement and others signified their willingness to abide by its stipulations.

TO PRESERVE CHINA.

"Not only, however, has the secretary suggested the limiting of the zone of hostilities, but he has improved the op-portunity to make another step toward preserving China's integrity. Examina-tion of his note will show no reference whatsoever to the integrity of China, but certainly the neutralization of that country must contribute powerfully to the preservation of China's integrity and the maintenance of its administrative control. The note is general in tive control. The note is general in character, and therein lies its greatest strength. Germany was the first to respond favorably. In the case of France it was necessary for that gov-ernment to assure itself that there was nothing in the suggestion to which Russia might take exception." After addressing Germany, Great Britain and France, Secy. Hay sent the same note to the other powers signa-tory to the peace protocol of 1900, in-cluding Austria-Hungary. Italy, Neth-erlands, Belgium and Spain, and finally

in the support of the principle for this government stood. M. Jusserand, the French ambassa-dor, had a long conference with Count Cassini, the Russian ambassador today. The note of Secy. Hay was discussed and in the personal opinion of the two diplomats its humane purpose was approved. FEELING IN DIPLOMATIC CIRCLES

In diplomatic circles the feeling is strong that Russia will acquise in the suggestion both as to the limiting of hostilities and the neutralization of China when she has assured herself that no ulterior purpose is involved. On the authority of a high administration official it can be stated that this government has no intention of suggesting anything about Korea. It is recognized that Korea is the natural battleground, and it is useless even to discuss the neutralization of that coun-

It was decided today that the cruiser squadron of the Astaile fleet with pro-priety could go as far north as Shang-hal, and orders to that effect have been sent. From there one of the vessels will be sent northward to Chemulpo, Korea, to maintain communication with the American legation at Seoul. Probably the vessels of the cruiser squad-ron will take turns about at this duty. It is possible that several naval at-taches may be sent to Manchuria. It has been suggested that a naval offi-cer at Dalny and one at Mukden or Antung could be of assistance to the onsuls this government is sending

Admiral Uria of the Japanese fleet was graduated from the naval academy at Annapolis in 1888.
