 Clarkston, Cache County, has just finished threshing an unprecedented bountiful harvest.
 We are gratified to learn that F. S. Richards, Esq., of Ogden, who has lately been confined to his bed by sickness, is recovering.
 It is believed that the Oregon short line railroad, now being built from Granger, Wyoming, will not pass nearer to Boise City than ten miles.
 A gang of horse thieves who operate in Idaho, Oregon, and other States and Territories are said to have their headquarters in Wyoming.
 Mr. E. H. Orem has presented to the management of the Fair, a pair of silver napkin rings, to be awarded to the second best baby at the infantile competition to-morrow evening.
 The many friends of Mr. H. E. Giles should not fail to attend his testimonial concert to-night, at the 15th Ward Assembly Room. He is a deserving young gentleman and an excellent organist.
 In addition to the \$30 prize, given by the Oyster Grotto, to be assigned to the best baby, the same firm adds five pounds of candy, to be awarded to the mother of the fortunate specimen of infantile loveliness.
 Yesterday afternoon South Temple Street was lined along each side with large throngs of people, who assembled to witness the passage towards the cemetery of the cortege which conveyed the remains of Apostle Orson Pratt.

 Mr. B. B. Young, who sailed for Europe from New York on the 20th ult., per S. S. *Wyoming*, arrived at Queenstown in safety nine days later. In mid-ocean, the vessel caught fire from its engine, but the flames were discovered and extinguished in time to obviate any disaster.
 This evening the surrounding atmosphere of the Eagle Emporium will be filled with sweet sounds of harmony, by Crenall's fine brass band. They will perform on the street in the interest of the Home Dramatic Club, and then adjourn to the Theatre. They will be in uniform.
 To-morrow afternoon the Dramatic Combination will give a grand "Sea of Ice" matinee. It will begin at 4 o'clock and will give a fine opportunity for the Conference folk to see that splendid spectacular piece. The other evening a large number were unable to gain admittance, the crowd being so great.
 Many inquiries were made yesterday as to the cause of so much gun firing at Fort Douglas. The explanation is that official notification of President Garfield's death was only received on Wednesday, and the salutes were fired according to order. The delay was occasioned by red tape, which is out of date with this rapid age.
 LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.
 Painful Accident.—A very painful accident occurred at Clarkston, Cache County, on Wednesday, September 28th. While Eugene Stine was greasing the side gear of a threshing machine, from which the guard was broken off, his shirt sleeve was caught in the cog, drawing his hand in. The forefinger and little finger were torn out and the ends taken off the two middle ones. The back of the hand, wrist and arm were also very badly bruised and lacerated.
 Dr. Lamereux, of Logan, was sent for and attended to the unfortunate man's injuries. The patient is doing as well as could be expected. The thumb and the larger portion of the two middle fingers will be saved.
 Stine is a stranger in the place, and is receiving the most kindly attention at the home of Mr. B. K. Homers. These facts were communicated to us by "W. N. C." a special correspondent of the *News*.
 Theatre.—Our space last evening was too limited to notice the drama at any length. "Queen's Evidence" was presented by the Home Dramatic Club on Wednesday evening, for the second time with splendid effect to an immense audience. All the performers appeared to great advantage and the piece went smoothly from beginning to end. The universal verdict was "first-class."
 The "Sea of Ice" drew a crowd last night which packed the Theatre from pit to dome. It was hugely enjoyed and was played as only the old favorites who appeared in it could present it. The admirable manner in which it was put upon the stage elicited deserved encomiums. It was a full dramatic success.
 To-night that excellent play "The Banker's Daughter," will be performed with all its unique and attractive scenery, dresses, appointments, etc., and will no doubt draw an intelligent audience that will fill the house as it deserves to do.
 To-morrow night that most fascinating domestic drama, "The Willow Copse," will be played by the Dramatic Combination. This is a play that goes nerve, tire of seeing. The public will remember its having a long run here and many years since with Mr. Cookstock as Old Luke, the part that will be ably interpreted by Mr. McKenna. Moore, Margrets and Graham have characters that will make heads of fun, and Miss Colebrook and others will enact the other prominent roles of the piece.
 A Rare Relief.—We have been permitted by Brother James Finlayson, of Payson, to see what we consider to be a valuable relic. It is a copy of the London *Times* of June 22, 1815, which contains the Duke of Wellington's official account of the Battle of Waterloo, a several minor engagements, which were fought during the three or four days immediately preceding that famous conflict.
 The document from the pen of the "Iron Duke" is exceedingly well written, being very simple yet graphic. The most commonplace language is used in it, which, instead of detracting from, adds to the force of the narrative. He is exceedingly liberal in his commendations of the conduct of the officers and troops. His allusion to the intrepid, dashing, unflinching Gen. Thomas Picton, who fell at the head of his troops while leading a bayonet charge, is almost touchingly pathetic.
 There has been some dispute as to whether the British could have carried the memorable day without the timely aid of Marshal Blucher with his Prussian corps. The Duke, in this document, seems to settle that point. He said: "I should not do justice to my feelings or to Marshal Blucher and the Prussian army if I did not attribute the successful result of this arduous day, to the cordial assistance I received from them."
 The Duke makes no attempt to hide the extent of his losses—a subterfuge so common in modern warfare—which he occasionally describes as "immense."
 Another statement in this same number of the *Times*, gives an idea of how regiments sometimes suffered almost complete annihilation in the Peninsular War. We quote: "What made the fate of the 79th and 42d regiments so severe, was their having been taken by surprise by a strong force of cuirassiers who lay in ambush for them in a road, the whole of which was intercepted by fields of corn immensely high. With such fury was the 79th regiment attacked that most of them were cut to pieces, and the whole were in danger of being destroyed, but for the coming up of the brave 42d. This latter regiment formed itself into a square and five times were they broken. On the sixth attack they formed a plan of opening a passage to the enemy; and the moment they effected it they changed their position, and so hemmed in the cuirassiers that not a single man was suffered to escape; thus was the destruction of one of Bonaparte's finest regiments completed. Next Saturday, when the 79th was mustered, the men amounted to 10 more than 54 and two officers."
 This engagement occurred on the plains of Fleurus.
 This old number of the *Times*, commonly known as the "Thunderer," measures 17 by 13 inches; very different from the mammoth sheet of the present day. Brother Finlayson procured the relic from a friend in Scotland, while on his mission, and purpose presenting it to the Museum.
 A Desperate Pair.—Sheriff Gray, of Weiser, Idaho, has arrived at Boise with a prisoner giving the name of Robert Morgan, but who has an indefinite number of aliases. Morgan was one of a party of desperadoes who stole a band of 100 head of horses from the Weiser, Idaho, range, last August. He and a notorious character named Robert Barker were arrested, in Bear River Valley, by Sheriff Call, of Randolph, under peculiar circumstances.
 Barker and Morgan called at Sheriff Call's ranch, hiding a couple of magnificent horses. The officer had a description of Barker, and recognized him. He got assistance, and getting wind of what was going on, Barker and Morgan took shelter in an adjacent log hut, where the Sheriff and posse found them. Mr. Call commanded them to hold up their hands. Morgan obeyed, but Barker replied by drawing a revolver and presenting it square at the officer. The latter pushed the muzzle of a shotgun into the ruffian's face, when he submitted. Morgan weakened at once and was very docile, but Barker was bold and defiant. A wagon was prepared to take the two prisoners to Evanston, and Barker asked if he might go and see his horse before leaving. This was granted. The moment he got near the animal with one bound he leaped upon its back and dashed off like the wind. The posse at once opened fire upon the fugitive, shot and killed the noble horse, and brought the desperado to the ground unhurt.
 The prisoners were taken to Evanston, where they were handcuffed together and Sheriff Call started with them for Ogden, on the way to Boise. When near Croysden, Morgan County, Barker asked leave to go to the stable. He went inside with his arm extended by the door with his arm extended through the door. After awhile the Sheriff thought a rather long time was elapsing. On going to the closet he found Morgan with his arm, which had been attached by iron to Barker's arm, still held inside, but Barker had bolted. He had, by Morgan's aid, unfatened the manacle, leaped through the window and escaped. Sheriff Call, aided by Sheriff Gray of Weiser, made active search for the fugitive, but without success.
 Barker is one of the worst men in the west. He is of fine, powerful physique, a professional cattle thief, and is reported to have killed several men. Morgan is of the cowardly ruffian type.
