MRS. CROCKER AWARDED \$12,000.

Sued the Union Pacific for \$25,000 For the Death of Her Husband.

MUSICIANS TO FILL CONTRACTS

Commercial Travelers Organize—Six New Postal Clerks—Directors Weber and Davis Counties Irrigation Co.

Mrs. Georgia Crocker, administratrix of the estate of her deceased husband, Charles Crocker, was given a verdict Saturday night for \$12,000 against the Union Pacific Railroad company. The case was on trial during all of last week and was brought to recover \$25,000 alleged to be due for injuries deceased sustained Aug. 26, 1902, while he was in the employ of the Union Pacific in this city as switchman, and as a result of the injuries Mr. Crocker died, being only 24 years of age. The principal testimony of the prosecution went to show that the accident was caused by the negligence of a Union Pacific engineer employed by the defendant who had every opportunity to know of his incompetency as an engineer. Mr. Crocker was on the date of injury, engaged with a switching crew in handling five cars, four of which were loaded and one empty. Mr. Crocker went in between the cars to uncouple the empty which was to be switched on to a siding, after making the uncoupling he started to climb the car to set the brakes when suddenly the engineer started forward and Crocker was caught between the cars and crushed. This was the testimony of plaintiff's witnesses. The principal testimony of the defense was to show that Linsley was a competent engineer. The jury was out but a short time when they returned with a unanimous verdict awarding \$12,000 to Mrs. Crocker.

His brother, W. T. Scheld, will leave this morning for Park City, and will return this evening with the body. Arrangements for the funeral will not be made until his brother, Karl A. Scheld, who is now in California, has heard from. Mr. Scheld also leaves a brother, John, and three sisters, Mrs. J. T. Donnell, Mrs. J. S. Myers and Miss Elsie Scheld, all of whom are in California, and who will be shocked and grieved to learn of his sudden death.
