The car which had previously left the barn made several trips up and down, not carrying any passengers. At the corner of State and Pearl streets, when the car came upon its second run, boy threw a brick at it. A man who saw the act caught the boy by the shoulder. In an instant the mob had orn the boy away and assaulted the citizen who held him.

Nearly a dozen of the non-union men the company brought from out-of-town deserted after the attack on the second car. They were carried away in tri-uniph on the strikers' shoulders. The indications are that if the com-pany persists in running the cars the national guard will have to be called

The crew deserted the car after mak. ing two trips. On its last trip this car was obstructed by planks taken from buildings in course of construction and piled upon the track while crowds gathered at nearly every street corner; stones, bricks and sticks were thrown at the car, and the motorman and conductor

The non-union men brought here are reported to have notified the corpora-tion that they had decided not to take out cars. No attempt has been made to operate the Union Traction company's lines in Cohoes, Rennslaer, Troy and Watervieit, on which the employes struck when those in Albany walked

The motorman who was injured at the car barns, is in a precarious con-dition. His skull is fractured in three places and his left shoulder is broken. His name is Woodward and his home is in Brooklyn.
