#### SALOON WAS BURGLARIZED

Their attention was then turned to the slot machine which they broke open, securing about \$70 in 50 cent pieces; they helped themselves to the liquors and then departed by front door. The police are investigating but have little clue to work on.

At about 1 o'clock Saturday night A. Waldram, who resides at 122 Twentyfourth street, was awakened by a noise in the kitchen, that sounded like a dog in the house. Just then her daughter, who had been to a ball, returned home with a gentleman escort and the screams of Mrs. Waldram had attracted two neighbors, who ran to Mr. Waldram's assistance and the four men had a hard task to overpower the man who had smashed the entire window and was in the kitchen. He had a large knife on him, which they took away and then after a hard fight landed him at the police station. In his pockets was found \$240 in gold. It is believed that the man was suffering from an attack of insanity and had not entered the house for the purpose of burglarizing it. When Mr. Waldram returned home from the police station he saw another man by the back fence and caught him, but he proved by taking Mr. Waldram to a near by house that he lodged ther and the lady had sent him out to se what the noise was and to send for the police, so he was turned loose.

HARRY ELKES KILLED,

Falls Victim to Terrible Accident on Charles River Track.

Cambridge, Mass., May 30.—Harry D. Elkes of Giens Falls, N. Y., the premier motor-pace follower of the United States, was killed and Will Stinson, aimost as well known as a bicyclist as Elkes, and F. A. Gately, a motor steetsman, were seriously injured in an accident at the initial bicycle meeting on the new Charles river park track this afternoon.

The accident occurred in the first lap of the sixteenth mile of a motor-paced race, and was due to the bursting of the rear tire on Elkes' wheel at a point where the track bank is at an angle of about 33 degrees. Elkes tried to stop his machine and in doing so was thrown over the handlebars, turning a complete somersault, and with his wheel rolled down the steep embankment in front of Stinson's motor, which was manned by Gately. The heavy motor struck Elkes, throwing Gately and the machine completely over him, and Stinson, whe was following, crashed into the wreck. At the time of the accident Elkes was well in the lead, having made new world's records for the five, ten and lifteen miles.
