WORK ELECTRIC LIGHT PLANT

Street Car System—New Sugar Plant—Board of Horticulture.

Logan, Cache Co., May 30.—A special meeting of the Logan city council was held Wednesday evening, at which bids for the electric dynamo for the city street car system were opened. It was decided to accept the bid of the Westinghouse company, \$4,912, for the dynamo, it being \$109 less than the next lowest. The contract provides that the dynamo must be installed in five months. The sum of \$4,920 was appropriated for the payment in full for the site. The grade for the pipe has been completed and the dynamo is being installed. The estimated expense of \$2,000, it being found that the conditions were much more favorable than had been anticipated. Mayor Hansen announces that all bids for the pipe line must be in by Wednesday, June 3.
