LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

MEETINGS IN THE TABERNACLE at 11 a.m. and 2 p.m. to-morrow, and in the evening at the various ward meeting houses.

THEATRE.—Last evening Miss Rose Evans took her benefit before a good house, when she appeared in five different plays and was repeatedly called before the curtain. Mr. Isaac was also loudly applauded. This evening there is a grand bill, consisting of a new version of *Lady Audley's Secret*, and the popular drama of *Abraham and Isaac*, in both of which Miss Rose Evans and Mr. Blumenthal will appear. Such a liberal programme should prove a strong attraction.

COURSE OF LECTURES.—Mr. McDonald, a physiologist, from Scotland, we understand, will give a course of six lectures in the Tabernacle commencing to-morrow night. The subject for to-night is "Human Nature and Physiology." No charge will be made for admission to the first lecture.

BEES AND STROOK.—We have received, from Brother John Morgan, President of the Mill Creek Branch of the Society for the Introduction and Improvement of the Stock, Broom, Fish, etc., the minutes of a meeting of that association, held in Mill Creek Ward meeting house, Jan. 17.

It was unanimously agreed at the meeting, that a Bee Convention be held at the same place, Feb. 12th, and that an invitation be extended to all bee keepers in the Territory, through the columns of the *Evening News*, to attend the same. Brother Morgan having kindly tendered the use of the meeting house in which to hold the convention.

ARRESTED AGAIN.—Alexander Hart was arrested again, to-day, on the old charge of being connected with the Robinson murder case, an indictment having been returned against him, to-day, by the Grand Jury. It is generally supposed that indictments have also been found against others, who have been in confinement and awaiting the action of the jury.

THE GRAND JURY.—The Grand Jury was adjourned, to-day, till the 20th day of February, with the understanding that they were liable to be called together at any time prior to that date, should circumstances make it necessary.

PIEDMONT.—Improvements going on at Merchandise from Salt Lake-Piedmont and Ballouville Narrows Gorge.

PIEDMONT, Nevada, January 19.—The new stone county Court House, with brick front, is nearly completed, and a fine structure. Improvements go steadily forward. Nearly all the burnt district is covered with new buildings. A Mormon train arrived to-day, 45 days from Toano, loaded with assorted merchandise. Many purchases will hereafter be made at Salt Lake, and the train will be a great help to the merchants of the Utah Southern Railroad this year. The iron, etc., for the Piedmont and Ballouville narrow gauge railroads will weigh some nineteen pounds to the yard. Utah merchants and shippers are getting plenty of business from this quarter, if they will canvass the matter. The weather and roads are again fine.

THE TERRITORIAL LEGISLATURE.

Friday, Jan. 19.
COUNCIL.—Council met pursuant to adjournment.

Communications from Hon. J. L. High, Gen. Geo. B. Maxwell, and others, expressing thanks for courtesies extended, were received and read.

COMMITTEE ON AGRICULTURE, TRADE AND MANUFACTURES.—Reported "an Act establishing estray pounds and prescribing regulations for conducting the same," which was read and received.

"An Act providing for holding a Convention to prepare a Constitution for the admission of Utah into the Union as a State," and "an Act providing for the election of Delegates to a Convention to prepare a Constitution for the admission of Utah into the Union as a State," were recommended.

COUNCILOR HARRINGTON.—from the Committee on Judiciary, reported back "an Act providing for the election of Delegates to a Convention to prepare a Constitution for the admission of Utah into the Union as a State," and the bill passed.

COUNCILOR CANNON.—presented a bill for "an Act to prescribe the manner of conducting Criminal Proceedings," which was read and referred.

On motion of Councilor Woodruff, "an Act defining the time of commencing Civil actions," was called up and referred.

On motion of Councilor Cannon, the Council adjourned till Saturday at 11 a.m.

HOUSE.

Mr. Peacock presented financial report of Sanpete County for the year 1870 and 1871, which was referred.

Mr. Rockwood moved that Mr. S. Snow, Attorney-General of this Territory, be requested to report to this House, as early as day as practicable, such other information as may be in his possession, relating to the decisions of the Supreme Court of this Territory on the subject of the Jurisdiction of the Probate Courts, and the offices of the Territorial Marshal and Attorney General, and whether or not any suit or suits are now pending relating to these subjects; if so, in what courts, and what is their condition. Carried.

Mr. Richards moved that the Auditor of Public Accounts be requested to report to this House whether or not there has been any demand made upon him by Mr. M. T. Patrick, U. S. Marshal for Utah, for funds to defray the expenses of the District Court for the years 1870 and 1871, if so, when, and whether or not he had paid any expenses of these Courts on Marshal Patrick's order, and if so, what amount, and whether or not he had any correspondence with Mr. S. Snow, Attorney-General, relating to these subjects; if so, that he report that correspondence to the House, and whether any other correspondence which may have passed between him and the Executive or any other of the Federal officers of the Territory on the subject. Carried.

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Mr. Richards presented petition of Mr. John T. Snodgrass, and 25 others, citizens of Salt Lake County, praying for a competent stock, trespass and damage law, which was read and referred.

Mr. Taylor presented a bill for "an Act entitled an Act providing for incorporating associations for mining, manufacturing, commercial and other industrial purposes," which was read and referred.

Mr. Taylor presented petition of W. F. Appleby to be declared a Public Officer of Salt Lake County, which was read and referred.

Mr. Taylor presented petition of Orson Pratt, praying for relief, which was read and referred.

On motion of A. P. Rockwood, the Auditor of Public Accounts was requested to furnish the House a summary report of the Secretary and Treasurer, as contemplated in Section 13 of an Ordinance incorporated in the Constitution of the State of Deseret. Approved Feb. 20th, 1892.

The financial report of Morgan County for the years 1870 and 1871 was presented and referred.

On motion of Mr. Preston, House adjourned till Saturday at 10 a.m.

HOUSE.—Council amendments to "an Act providing for holding a Convention to Prepare a Constitution for the admission of Utah into the Union as a State," were read and referred.

Mr. Murdoch presented the financial report of Beaver County, for the years 1870 and 1871. Referred.

Mr. Howberry presented a bill for an Act amending an act entitled "an Act authorizing and empowering the Secretary of the Territory to receive and collect fees in certain cases," approved Jan. 18, 1881. Read and referred.

On motion of Mr. Rockwood, the Committee on Counties were instructed to take into consideration the present boundaries of Counties and ascertain if by the running of the Territorial lines any part of the Territory is left without a County organization, and report by bill or otherwise.

On motion of Mr. Peacock, the committee on Claims and Appropriations were instructed to ascertain the present condition of the Great Seal of the Territory and, if in their judgment a new one is needed, to incorporate in the General Appropriations bill a sufficient amount to purchase a new seal.

Mr. S. S. Smith presented the financial report of Iron County for 1871. Referred.

Adjourned till Monday Jan. 22nd, at 10 a.m.
