An English magistrate has sent a vagrant to prison for three months for stealing an infant for "begging purposes."

A piece of silver money, about the size of a quarter of a dollar, and bearing the date 629, was recently dug up at Plymouth, N. C.

One Harry Robinson advertises himself in the theatrical papers as a "singing, musician and mechanical donkey."

A London publisher announces a religious tract with the following title: "Salts and Senna, a Cathartic in Seven Doses."

There are about ten thousand Indians in Minnesota, all Chippewas. They live on a reservation in the northern part of the State, and cost the government \$300,000 annually.

The largest hotel in Europe is to be built on the banks of the Lago Maggiore. Singularly enough, it is not to be put up by Americans, but by Frenchmen and Prussians.

Good circus acrobats of recognized celebrity get salaries of about \$100 a week. Blondin, at the London Crystal Palace, receives as much as Sims Reeves, the tenor—about \$500 a night, in gold. There are in the profession, however, good performers who have yet to make a name, and, consequently, cannot earn more than thirty or forty dollars a week.

Hon. James Harper, of New York, formerly Mayor of that city, and the head of the great publishing house, commenced life a poor apprentice boy, and by his own unaided industry and good morals, rose to distinction and wealth. It is one of those examples in life that guide and strengthen young men in their struggles for success.

Even imperial journalism in Paris is not without its drawbacks. Paul de Cassagnac, one of the most servile adulators of the Empire, has been branded as a liar more than five hundred times; has been spit upon in the street seven times, and suffered four weeks of the nose and four public horsewhippings. He has fought nearly a hundred duels, for which offence he has been several times imprisoned, and now has sixteen challenges outstanding.
