NEW YORK, 17.—The World's

gress. An examination of the

shows that this preliminary com-

mittee action has been the rule

rather than the exception. Thus

for not a single objection has been

raised to it. A complete record is

found in the journals of the two

houses and verbatim reports of the

joint conventions which have

been held at the Capitol. The

foundation of the Government have

been complied for the use of Con-

gress and the committee, and there

will be no delay in getting at work

at the earliest practicable moment.

A conclusion, it is said, can be

reached after the fullest confidence

of the middle of January. The ac-
