LACKED ONE VOTE.

The Mayor's Veto of the Lighted Contract is Sustained.

FIVE STOOD BY THE MAYOR.

Thus Depriving the Contract of the Necessary Majority—Wants Six Thousand for Flood Damage.

The veto by Mayor Glendon of the street lighting contract with the Rig Cottonwood Power company was sustained in the Council last night.

When the vote was called on City Councilman Callender asked for a count of the Mayor's statements on the grounds that they were very misleading.

In answer to the assertion of the Mayor that the lighting of the streets could not be done until more cheaply, Mr. Callender said the Salt Lake & Ogden company was willing to throw open its books and show that money was lost at \$140 per light.

As to the proposition of the Power company, that could not be considered because it came in after the Council's recommendation of the Rig Cottonwood contract had been made.

Mr. Callender said that so far as the statement about the expense of light in the city was concerned it was a well known fact that that city had several thousand more lights than we have; and furthermore, the company having the contract has offered to furnish \$50,000 per year in consideration of a release from the contract.

Mr. Callender said his objection to the contract being made for more than a year, and stated the indication were that the Rig Cottonwood company was getting the upper hand in electrical circles in the city.

Councilman Ramsey thought that if the citizens could or would stand it to be in darkness for a year he would sustain the veto. He favored a one-year contract, but as the Council had decided for two years he would vote for the release of the contract.

Mr. Callender said that the Mayor's veto rather than allow the city to remain in darkness for a year.

Mr. Callender said in view of the fact that the Salt Lake & Ogden company was capitalizing for double the value and had no sufficient claim with which to reimburse the city, there was no wonder it could not afford to furnish lights at a cheaper rate.

He was of the opinion that if the veto was sustained the committee would "go over each other" in a scramble to make a contract.

Councilman O'Leary, assigned the Mayor and his veto to a short speech and a bill with Mr. Stahl, who became somewhat nettled at the former's assertions. O'Leary had a big, typewritten document in his hand which came from Mr. Melker and was a report on the expense of municipal lighting.

He said that although the paper cost the city \$100 he was not going to submit it to the Council.

Mr. Winchell was in favor of an approval of the contract, but objected to some of the remarks made by gentlemen against the Mayor's veto.

The question being put the contract was lost by the following vote: Ayes—Allen, Buckle, Callender, Et.

STREET AND FLOODS.

Watermaster Wickham noted the appropriation of \$1000 for the repair of damages caused by the recent high water. He reported that the sewerage on North Temple was badly damaged, due to City creek being damaged, lumbering bridges were broken, and many houses had been flooded.

Mr. Wickham asked the Council to require the Union Pacific and the Utah & Northern railway companies to either raise their tracks or subsidize steel springs for the wooden ones now in use.

The reason for this request was that the bridges over the viaduct on North Temple were now in a very bad state of repair and the water damage in the city will not be repaired until the summer.
