LACKED ONE VOTE.

The Mayor's Vote of the Lighting Contract is Sustained.

THE STOOD BY THE MAYOR

Thus Dropped the Contract of the Necessary Majority—Wants Six Thousand for Fixed Damage.

The vote by Mayor Glendinning of the street lighting contract with the Big Cottonwood Power company was sustained in the Council last night. When the vote was cast on Councilman Callister spanned fire on some of the Mayor's statements on the grounds that they were very misleading. In answer to the assertion of the Mayor that the lighting of the streets cost \$2,000, Mr. Callister said the Salt Lake & Ogden company was willing to throw its books open and show that there was less than \$2,000 per month. As to the proportion of the Price company, that could not be considered because it came in after the Council's recommendation of the Big Cottonwood contract had been made.

Mr. Callister said that so far as the statement of the Mayor concerning the lighting of the city was concerned it was a well known fact that the city has several thousand more lights than there were; furthermore, the company having the contract have offered to forfeit \$50,000 per year in consideration of a reduction in the contract.

Mr. Dale read his objection to the contract being made for more than a year, and stated the indications were that the Big Cottonwood company was getting a great deal in consideration of the contract.

Councilman Remond thought that if the citizens could or would stand to be in darkness for a year he would sustain the vote. He further said that the Rev. Dr. C. L. Conant had decided for the year he would vote for the passage of the contract over the Mayor's, who rather than allow the city to remain in darkness for a year, Mr. Remond said, in view of the fact that the Big Cottonwood company was capitalized for double the value and had no ancient rights with which to manufacture the light, there was no reason it could not afford to furnish light at a lower rate. He said the option given that if the vote was sustained the companies would "fall over each other" in a scramble to make a contract.

Councilman Remond assigned the Mayor the task of making a statement to till with Mr. Dale, who was somewhat perturbed at the former's assertions. O'Meara had a big typewritten document in his hand which came from Mr. McKey and was a report on the lighting contract. He said that although the price of \$100,000 was not going to inflict its rating upon the Council.

Mr. Wimsett was in favor of an approval of the contract, but objected to some of the terms, particularly the guarantee against the Mayor's vote.

The question being put the contract was lost by the following vote:

A two-thirds vote was being necessary to override the Mayor, but the Councilmen voted in the contract, leaving for a present the contract over the Mayor's objection.

ONE THOUSAND FOR PLUMBERS.

Watermaster Wicksen said the apprehension of \$100 for the results of the water damage caused by the recent winter storm, and that the amount on North Temple was badly damaged, done in City areas were damaged, tanks up and many houses had been flooded. The water damage was estimated to be \$1,000. The Union Pacific and the Colorado & Western railway companies are either to take their tracks or reinforce steel springs for the winter snows now in use. The reason given is that the water damage over the year past in North Temple they are not interfere very much with the water damage in case of a flood. The contractors are irrigating the matter up.

The trustees voted to increase the salary of the minister to \$3,000.
