

THREE WARDS BEING PACKED BY "AMERICANS"

First, Second and Fourth Municipal Precincts are Shamelessly Colonized Today—Every Room at Hotels Rented—400 Transfers Secured Today from the Fifth Municipal Ward to Buttress up Weak Places—Arrested Vagrants Confess Police are in Illegal Registration Scheme.

With every indication that the First, Second and Fourth municipal wards are being packed today by the "Americans" for the city council, the Citizens-Democratic committee and the Republican committee have sent canvassers through every street to keep a double check on the voters. The colonization scheme is being carried out by the "American" party by transferring voters from one ward to another. The transfers are being secured under the direction of the "American" campaign committee.

It is estimated that about 400 transfers have been secured today from the Fifth ward to the First, Second and Fourth wards. The Fifth ward is the only ward where the "American" party has votes to spare. Many of the transfers have been filed in the First municipal ward. In the First ward, every room has been rented this morning. This hotel is in the First ward, which is in the First municipal ward where the fusion candidates were elected two years ago by a small plurality.

J. C. Robinson, who has been investigating the situation there, declared to the chairman of the Citizens-Democratic committee this morning that before night there would not be a standing room in the hotel. Candidates are at work tracing these voters as fast as they are filed and a number of arrests will probably be made at the hotel tomorrow. There are two more houses on State street, in the First ward, where rooms are being rented for tonight. It is probable that the transfers will be filed until late this afternoon, but the canvassers are at the lookout for every case that comes to their attention.

J. B. Morrison, long term, and J. W. McKay, short term, are the "American" candidates for the council from the First ward. One of the hardest spots that the "Americans" are making is in the First ward. Frank J. Hovell, long term, and Joseph S. Hyde, short term, are the fusion candidates for the council. They are working this morning in an effort to stop all the irregular votes that the "Americans" are attempting to deliver to their candidates in this ward.

STRIKES BISHOP WITH LOADED CANE

A. H. Kirk Calls Bishop Worthen Out of Bed at Midnight And Assaults Him.

UNDER INFLUENCE OF DRINK

Disgraceful Scene in Fourth Ward—Drunken Father Objected to Son Going on Mission.

To be called out of bed at midnight for the purpose of receiving a thrashing, simply because the intruder thought he had something to do with his son going on a mission, is a novel experience even for a bishop who stands in a place where for all sorts of things blame might be thrown on his shoulders by the disaffected. Yet this is what happened to Bishop Worthen on Saturday night between 11 and 12 o'clock, in front of his own house and in his own lot. He was given a blow on the temple with a loaded cane which nearly laid him out, and rendered him unable to go outside the house all day Sunday. This morning he is still in a partially dazed condition as the result of the blow.

The man who apparently tried to kill the bishop is Arthur H. Kirk, by occupation a plasterer, who resides at 18 south First west street. He had been drinking during the evening and had come home in a rather ugly mood. His great grievance seemed to be the fact that his son Oscar is going on a mission to Europe this week. A farewell reception had been held for him in the ward meetinghouse on Friday night, all of which was in direct opposition to Kirk's feelings. The boy wants to go and his mother it is said is anxious for him to go, but Kirk has always been opposed to anything of the kind. He had a son who went once before and he was also opposed to his going, though he never made a demonstration like the present, and his family say that he never would have acted as he did Saturday were it not for drink.

BISHOP WARNED.

The fact remains, however, that after using various explosives at home during the evening, he decided to go and have it out with the bishop at his home. As soon as he had started on his journey as an avenger, one of the girls called up the Worthen home by phone and warned Mrs. Worthen that "papa" was coming and she was afraid that he would do something dreadful as he was very much worked up against the bishop.

Mrs. Worthen informed the bishop and he descended and came downstairs as Kirk reached the door with his hand in his pocket. The bishop asked him to take his hand out of his pocket, and when he refused, the bishop, sure that he had in his hand something with which to do him injury, reached his hand out of his pocket when it appears that he had no weapon of any kind. The bishop then turned to speak to Mr. Kirk, and as he did so he was suddenly dealt a heavy blow across the temple, which dazed him and nearly felled him to the ground. He grappled with his assailant and both fell on the ground, where the bishop held Kirk until Officer Sperry came and took him to jail, where he has since been locked up.

Members of Kirk's family said today that he felt very sorry for what he had done, and that drink was responsible for the outbreak. Mrs. Worthen said that Kirk had intimated to the bishop several weeks ago that they could not handle Oscar as they did the other boy who went on a mission several years ago.

DOUBLE TRAGEDY AT AMERICAN FALLS, IDA

A. M. Abbott Fatally Shoots His Wife And Then Turns Gun on Himself and Suicides.

American Falls, Idaho, Nov. 1.—A. M. Abbott killed himself last night on the front porch of the Cottage hotel, after firing four bullets into Mrs. Abbott, who conducts the hotel. The trouble was caused by excessive drinking on the part of Abbott, which led Mrs. Abbott to sue for divorce. Since she took that action Mrs. Abbott has been in constant fear that Abbott would kill her, and she has carried a weapon to protect herself. Owing to the suddenness of his attack she was not able to use it.

Abbott has lived in this section for a number of years and was until recently foreman of A. H. Tarbet's ranch near here. When he was not drinking he was considered an easy man to get along with. A brother of Mrs. Abbott living in Michigan and a son by a former marriage, who lives in Ruth, Nev., have both been notified.

WILL FIGHT FOR MONEY FOR WATERWAYS

Washington, Nov. 1.—The fight for the authorization for a bond issue for improvement of rivers and harbors will go on until it is won, despite the outspoken opposition of Speaker Cannon, according to Capt. J. P. Ellison, secretary of the national rivers and harbors congress. "This question of a bond issue for waterways," said Mr. Ellison yesterday, "is a live one and the Congress of the United States will have to consider it seriously in the near future." Serious doubt is expressed by Mr. Ellison if a river and harbor bill, commensurate with the needs of the country, will be passed during the coming session, in view of the policy of the present administration to practice rigid economy during the next fiscal year.

SEPTEMBER EXPORTS.

Washington, Nov. 1.—During last September the United States exported goods to the value of \$123,889,257, an increase over the trade of September of last year of more than \$10,000,000. In September of this year, the United States imported goods to the amount of \$129,971,475, or more than \$22,500,000 in excess of September, last year. By far the greatest increases in both imports and exports are found in the trade between the United States and Europe, with North America a close second.

NEW LUMBER FIRM.

ANTICIPATE LIVELY TIMES IN KENTUCKY

Militia Called Out to Suppress Probable Trouble in Jackson And Breathitt Counties.

GOV. WILLSON HURRYING HOME

In New York Managers of the Three Mayoralty Candidates Claim They Will Be Elected.

Jackson, Ky., Nov. 1.—Because there are ominous signs of trouble in Jackson and Breathitt counties, on election day, tomorrow, members of the Lexington militia are encamped here and Gov. Willson is hurrying to Frankfort from the waterways convention at New Orleans. It is said in Jackson that the message from Frankfort to the governor was laconic and startling:

"Hell has broken loose in Breathitt." As some of the bloodiest affairs in the Kentucky have been fought here in Jackson on political occasions, the state authorities have wanted to time in putting the town under militia surveillance.

Circuit Judge J. P. Adams, Republican candidate for re-election against D. B. Redwine of Sandy Hook, Elliott county, sent the call for troops to acting Gov. W. H. Cox last night, declaring there were large forces of armed men upon the respective Republican and Democratic causes; that the county officials were powerless, and that a fight was imminent. The special train with militia on board arrived before daylight. Detachments were sent to Crockettville, War Creek, Sebastian Branch, Oakdale and other precincts where trouble is feared.

This will be the second time an election has been held in Breathitt under the protection of state troops. In 1905, when Judge James Hargis and Ed. Callahan were fighting for their political lives, it was necessary to have the troops here to preserve order.

ALL THREE PARTIES CLAIMING NEW YORK

New York, Nov. 1.—New York's mayoralty campaign will be carried right up to election evening, and to-night speeches in various parts of the city will be made by Otto T. Hunsard, Republican nominee for mayor, and Judge Gaynor, who heads the Democratic ticket.

William B. Hearst, the leader of the civic alliance, closed his campaign last night with the meeting in Madison Square garden.

At Tammany Hall today the leaders of the Tammany districts gathered at noon and received their final instructions from Leader Murphy.

The latter said today that Judge Gaynor would be elected, but that there are doubts. He predicted that Hearst would run second.

Herbert Parsons, who has had charge of the Republican campaign, said that the Republican ticket would carry 28,000 votes over Gaynor and by 120,000 votes over Hearst. He predicted an overwhelming plurality for the rest of the Republican fusion ticket.

CAMPAIGN IN OHIO HAS BEEN RATEER DULL

Cleveland, Nov. 1.—In the local campaign the last meeting was held at noon today when Mayor Tom L. Johnson, Democratic candidate for a fifth term, spoke at a dinner table. The Republican candidate, Herman C.

Healy, closed his campaign Saturday night. Cincinnati, Nov. 1.—Today puts the finishing touches on municipal campaigns in 77 cities and 493 villages in Ohio. With few exceptions these contests have been the quietest in years. In Cincinnati the campaign has been dull. The issue is taxation. The Republicans, who are in power, are charged with extravagance by the Democrats. Dr. Lewis Schwab is the Republican candidate for mayor, while John Wold Peck, a young lawyer, is the Democratic nominee.

STRAINING EVERY NERVE IN MASSACHUSETTS

Boston, Nov. 1.—Managers of the two great political parties strained every nerve today to arouse interest in tomorrow's election. In the last four years the Republican candidates have come down to Boston from the upper country with pluralities ranging well up to 100,000. Gov. Draper came to Boston last year with 72,000 plurality against James H. Vahey, his political opponent then as well as this year.

Boston gave Vahey a plurality of 12,500 and the Democratic state committee claims this will be increased to 20,000.

That the Democratic vote in Boston will be increased was generally admitted today by close political observers, who point out that a majority of the 25,000 voters who were in the Independence league last year will naturally go into the Democratic column.

SALOON GREAT ISSUE IN INDIANA CAMPAIGN

Indianapolis, Ind., Nov. 1.—Municipal campaigns throughout Indiana will close today and the voters will give their decisions in the elections tomorrow. The saloon question has been the principal issue, especially in Indianapolis. Samuel Lewis Blank, an auctioneer, is the Republican candidate for mayor. His Democratic opponent is Charles A. Gamse, master thrumth. Fremont Alfried is an Independent candidate.

ISSUE IN SAN FRANCISCO ADMITTED TO BE DOUBTFUL

San Francisco, Nov. 1.—San Francisco's municipal campaign will be waged until a late hour tonight, with each side of political meetings in various parts of the city. Political forecasters concede that the issue is in doubt as between William Crocker, Republican nominee for mayor, and John A. McArthur, Union labor and Dr. T. W. B. Leland, Democrat. The fight for the district attorneyship between Francis J. Heney, Democrat and Charles M. Fickert, Republican and Union labor, which over-shadowed the mayoralty contest, is likewise close and predictions as to the outcome are more guesswork.

KILLED AND BURNED TO DEATH ON SOUTHERN PACIFIC

Redding, Cal., Nov. 1.—Conductor Edward E. Rickard, son of Duaneville, California, was killed and Brakenridge Charles Neale of the same place was burned to death in the wreckage when the rear part of a freight train on the Southern Pacific was derailed upon early today in a tunnel between Kewick and Coram.

Brakenridge Neale, mysteriously fastened in the wreckage and unable to escape, and when he saw the flames from the burning freight cars creeping near, begged the bystanders to cut off his legs to free him from the twisted rods that held him down, but they were powerless to help him. He finally expired nearer and nearer and finally incinerated the doomed man, while the other members of the train crew stood by in horrified helplessness.

When the tunnel caved the caboose occupied by Conductor Richardson and Brakenridge Neale was almost completely buried under a mass of earth and rocks and with the overturning of the stove the wreckage immediately caught fire.

FORTUNE AWAITS HIM.

Police Search for Harvey E. Wilson, Who Disappeared From Oakland.

The Salt Lake police are searching for Harvey E. Wilson, who disappeared from Oakland, Cal., about three months ago. His brother-in-law, Earl L. Carter, a sergeant of police in Oakland, has written to Chief of Police Barlow, stating that Wilson left Oakland with the intention of going to Denver, Colo., or Hot Springs, Ark. His relatives are anxious to locate him, as his rich aunt died recently in Stockton, Cal., leaving a large estate, and Wilson is one of the chief beneficiaries under the will. Wilson is described as being 25 years of age, five feet and six inches tall, of dark complexion, weight about 120 pounds, slender build, black hair, and blue eyes. He was smooth shaven when last seen. He is a blacksmith and wagon and carriage maker by occupation, and belongs to the latter trade. His shoulders are higher than the other, owing to an injury received in youth. Wilson was born and reared in Stockton, Cal.

JUST BEFORE THE BATTLE

Both Fusion and Republican Managers Are Confident Regarding Tomorrow.

FINAL RALLIES FOR TONIGHT

Darmer Admits Fusion Makes it Bad for the "American" Outlook for Victory.

Wears a New Waistcoat and a Doubtful Expression This Morning—Heavy Vote Predicted.

The Citizens-Democratic party has practically closed its campaign for the election Tuesday. Meetings have been held in various parts of the city and the campaign committee feels that it has reached the ears of a majority of the voters of Salt Lake City. With only 10 days in which to make a vigorous campaign, the Citizens-Democratic party made rapid inroads on the "American" party vote. Chairman Ben T. Lloyd of the joint committee believes that the control of the city government will be wrested from the "Americans" by the fusion movement. The declaration of principles for which the movement stands is for the best interests of Salt Lake City and the residents. This is being realized, Chairman Lloyd says, and the people are going to vote for the fusion ticket.

An enthusiastic meeting for the candidates, district and precinct chairmen and workers was held Saturday night at the Citizens-Democratic headquarters in the Colonial theater building. Further details for the election were arranged. The work was assigned to the different organizations to get the voters out. Although the committee has only called for volunteer workers, there are 300 men and women who are out today and have been out every day for the past week working for the fusion ticket. Thirty automobiles have been offered to the committee free of charge to be used for the election day. The committee has also 600 carriages which were offered voluntarily. These vehicles have been assigned to various precincts and districts and the party will be able to take care of a good many of its voters on election day.

Another meeting of the workers will be held tonight at headquarters where the results of today's labors will be gone over. Instructions will be issued to the workers at the polls and lists of names will be prepared of challenges to be made.

Chairman Ben Lloyd was optimistic this morning about the situation. "I can see where Wallace and the major part of the Citizens-Democratic ticket will be elected. I predict a landslide, which is not at all uncommon. Despite the fact that our ticket has only been before the people 10 days and we only had a week in which to make a campaign, I believe that the citizens of Salt Lake will vote for a non-partisan business administration like our candidates represent."

REPUBLICAN RALLY.

The Republicans close their campaign tonight with a rally in the Odeon hall. Gov. William Spry, Senator George Rutherford, Charles D. Murdoch, Axel Steele, and Parley Jensen will speak. Refreshments will be served and dancing will be indulged in after the rally. Secy. Parley Jensen of the Republican committee said this morning, "The Republican organization is in perfect condition. All of our voters are registered, and we are getting them out to the polls without any trouble. Our campaign has been worked hard and I can see a Republican victory tomorrow from top to bottom."

DARMER IS DUBIOUS.

"The Americans" will hold their Rally tonight at the home of Mrs. Watkins at 608 south Sixth west street. Women are especially invited to this meeting. The speakers will be Mayor John S. Bradburn, Capt. Ross and Commander O'Donnell.

Chairman J. E. Darmer, chairman of the "American" party, donned a new waistcoat this morning and gave out an interview. "I'm the only thing the matter with the 'American' campaign was that the party had been unable to find anybody who would fuse with it."

Darmer wore such a doubtful expression on his face this morning that he furnished the other members of the campaign committee. "It is just this way," Mr. Darmer said confidentially, "I can't tell anything about the vote on a straight ticket. The fusion of candidates makes it bad, don't you know. It is really the right thing in politics in municipal government."

"Of course if you want an interview, say that the 'American' expects to win. That is what we hope for, but I can't give you any figures because I nor any other man can tell anything about how the vote is going this year."

INFORMATION IS WANTED ON ILLEGAL REGISTRATIONS

All lovers of law and order should make every effort to stop illegal voting on Tuesday, election day. Residents who know the whereabouts of any men or women who intend to cast an illegal vote are requested to call up the chairman of either the Citizens-Democratic committee or the Republican committee and give the desired information. A general colonization is being made in the First and Second municipal wards to defeat the fusion candidates in those precincts. In the Fifty-third and Fifty-fourth districts in the Fifth municipal ward there are indications of wholesale illegal registrations. This vote will elect Martin E. Mulvey, saloonman and gambler, to the council if it is not stopped at the polls.
