SALT LAKE BOAT WRECKED.

The shipbuilding industry in Salt Lake has received a severe black eye in the foundering of the Snake river of one of the big boats which was built here recently for the engineering department. The reports that have reached Salt Lake are somewhat meager but the assurances are forthcoming that the captain and crew escaped a watery grave although the mixed cargo went to the bottom. Briefly, the boat was being towed down from Huntington, Or., to the grade now being built along the Snake into northwestern Idaho. While negotiating some rapids the craft came to grief and everything from Uneda biscuits to the tripods and transits went to the bottom.

BUTTE INVESTORS COMING.

On Aug. 8 the Oregon Short Line will operate a real estate excursion from Butte to Salt Lake and return for the purpose of giving investors from the Copper City and Montana generally a chance to visit Salt Lake and get in on the ground floor before prices take a still further jump. Of course others besides prospective investors will take advantage of the \$15 rate to visit the attractions of this city and have a good time generally. Two trains will carry the pilgrims and already are there indications of a big invasion.

HEAVY SHEEP SHIPMENTS.

The sheep shipping season is now on in full blast on all lines and will in all probability continue until the end of October. Heavy shipments are reported from the Wood River branch of the Oregon Short Line and from the Soda Springs district. Soda Springs' record last year was 1,360 cars and there are already indications that this will be bettered this.

SWIFT CLIP ON SAN PEDRO.

The Salt Lake road's engineer hauling the Los Angeles limited, with General Manager R. E. Wells aboard, put on a little extra steam headed for Los Angeles Saturday night. And the limited came into town at a 75-mile an hour clip. Officials aboard compared their watches and remarked: "That's going some." Seventy miles an hour is not an unusual speed for this thoroughly up-to-date road from Chicago, but the order is to get in on time if possible, and it is done. The track from Riverside to Los Angeles is a safe one for speeding.—Los Angeles Herald.

BURLINGTON SURVEY.

Wyoming Editor Visits Salt Lake With A New Version.

Burlington surveyors are quietly working in the wilds of southwestern Wyoming, in the word brought here today by C. Watt Brandon, editor and proprietor of the Pinedale Roundup, published at Pinedale, Fremont county. At present there is a force camped and at work on the big Sandy at a point, says Mr. Brandon, where the line is to fork, one prong coming south towards Salt Lake, the other going north-west through the Black Butte country on in the direction of Yellowstone park. The old Burlington survey, he says, ran on the south bank of Green river. According to the information he has this is to be abandoned and the surveyors are now engaged in running a new line.

Mr. Brandon is an enthusiastic booster for Pinedale and he affirms that when that section has a railroad Pinedale will come to the front as one of the most picturesque resorts of the west. To hear him dilate upon the grandeur of the canyons, the hundreds of thousands of acres available with ample water and the astounding fish and game stories that that section is responsible for is calculated to make any man take off his hat and affirm that C. Watt Brandon is hiding his light under a bushel in the wilds of Wyoming.

WRECK WEST OF OGDEN.

Derailment of Passenger Train Blocks Traffic for Twelve Hours.

A derailment of eastbound passenger train No. 4 at Pogan station, about 134 miles west of Ogdan on the line of the Southern Pacific occurred yesterday, but meager details were received. Fireman Gray suffered quite serious injury and several passengers were badly shaken up but no one was killed. The train was not moving at a rapid rate of speed when it struck a spreading rail and the engine with several cars left the track, causing considerable damage to the same. A wrecking train was sent out from Ogdan and one from the west end to the scene of the wreck, but it required considerable time to clear the track and traffic was delayed about 12 hours.

FRANCHISE FOR S. L. & O.

Simon Hamberger Makes Arrangements With Weber Commissioners.

Simon Hamberger, president of the Salt Lake & Ogden, this morning stated that arrangements have been perfected with the commissioners of Weber county, whereby his road is granted a 30-year franchise to operate in that county.

Some minor changes have been agreed upon in the route and the line will run under the county road at Riverdale so that there will be no dangerous grade crossing.

JUDGE CORNISH HERE.

Harriman's Right-hand Man on Annual Tour of Inspection.

Judge W. D. Cornish, vice president of the various Harriman lines, accompanied by his secretary, arrived in Salt Lake this morning and spent a few hours here at Oregon Short Line headquarters. This afternoon he and General Manager W. H. Bancroft left on a special train for Marysville to inspect the Yellowstone park branch now being built.

RECORD TRACKLAYING.

Smart Work by Gangs on Rio Grande Narrow Gauge Branch.

Leon Sklaris, the Greek labor agent, has returned from Colorado, where he sent a gang of 330 Greeks to lay track on the Grand Junction-Montrose narrow gauge line. The gang did splendid work and converted the road into a standard gauge proposition in three days, covering 120 miles, or 40 miles a day.
