WASHINGTON, 1.—Senator Beck, in introducing the bill to prohibit members of Congress from acting as attorneys or employees of railroad companies that hold charters or have grants from the United States, remarked that there had been much criticism and recrimination in both houses about the matter of members of Congress being employed by railroad companies.

The bill, he said, was intended to see if a remedy could be provided for the trouble.

Miller called up the bill extending the eight-hour law to the letter carriers. He said that the Postoffice Department had ruled that the letter carriers were not entitled to come under the provisions of that law. Miller saw to reason why these employees should not be put on an equality with other employees.

The bill passed.

On motion of Dolph the Senate resumed the consideration of the Northern Pacific land forfeiture bill.

In defending the bill, Dolph said that the Northern Pacific land forfeiture bill was a bill to strip the land from the Northern Pacific Railroad Company.

The bill was passed.
