

TARIFF CONFEREES
WORKING VERY HARDAlready They Have Disposed of
About Four Hundred
Amendments.

LOBBYISTS GETTING BUSY.

Whenever a Member of the Conference Committee Comes Out of a Session They Surround Him.

Washington, July 13.—By passing over the cotton and woolen schedules without taking up any of the amended paragraphs, and skipping the disputed points connected with the rates on lumber in the wool schedule, the tariff conferees were able today to dispose of about 400 amendments.

Many important subjects, such as the house drawback feature of the alcohol paragraph, the rates on olefin, and the various items under the head of lithographs, were submitted to sub-committees.

When the night session was begun the conferees had reached sundries, nearly the last on the schedule. So many matters had been put over for future sessions, however, that it is difficult to tell just how much progress has been made.

The moment a member of the conference committee emerges from a session he is surrounded and besieged by lobbyists. Some of the conferees have adopted the plan of refusing to accept these arguments, basing their decision upon the ground that the bill has been considered in both branches of Congress, and that it is now the duty of the conference committee to harmonize the two schedules without outside influence of any kind.

The conferees predict that a report can be made before a week from Saturday, but some go as far as to forecast a week or later for the adjournment of the extra session.

When the conferees on the tariff bill begin their work today, they will have knowledge that the amendments to the

lumber schedule, over which a contest was certain, would be reached before adjournment. The house members were expected to make a strong fight for "dollar lumber," which was defeated in the senate.

In view of the fact that the lumber amendment will require a good deal of deliberation, it is likely that after the discussion has continued for a time the whole subject would be put over until another day and the conferees will dispose of minor amendments. The conferees have decided to clear up the disputes over matters of little importance before becoming entangled over the really serious differences.

Members of the senate committee on finance are preparing a statement replying to charges that senate amendments to the tariff will result in increasing the cost of woolen and cotton clothing, shoes and other articles of common wear, as well as other necessities of life.

The statement will show that the duty on shoes has been reduced and there has not been a single change in the rates on woolen goods, and that the rates on cotton have not been increased.

There will follow a list of about 500 decrements in rates from the Dingley law and a list of about 60 to 75 increases. An effort will be made to show that most of the latter are not in reality increases of rates, but that they provide for the collection of rates fixed by the Dingley law, which had been set aside by the misinterpretation of that law.

When tomorrow's session begins the struggle over the important differences between the house and the senate will open. This will put all the questions involving raw materials, which have

been the subjects of heated disputes, have been put over after brief discussions held for the purpose of determining the temper of the representatives of the two branches of Congress. The bill again will be taken up in the numerical order of the amendments, which means that the chemical schedule will be the first.

The session tonight was adjourned at 9:45 p. m. in order that the conferees could get the benefit of a good night's rest and be ready for the big battle at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

RELATIONS WITH JAPAN

NEVER MORE FRIENDLY

San Francisco, July 13.—The relations between Japan and the United States were never on a more friendly footing than they are today, according to Theodore O'Brien, American ambassador to Japan, who arrived from the orient today on a three months' vacation.

"I cannot say that I can see any likelihood of the relations becoming strained," said Ambassador O'Brien. "There is nothing that I know of in the present or immediate future that could bring about a change in the friendly attitude of each country toward the other."

"Virtually all treaties with Japan expire in 1911, but there is some question whether those with this country terminate until 1912. They have not been talked of except in a private way by the Japanese foreign office officials. At present the treaties are of a purely political nature, but the Japanese would like to see several commercial clauses inserted when they are renewed. This, however, has not been discussed except as a way, in a private way by the Japanese."

Park City, Mont., July 13.—Brooding over the death of his mother, which occurred several months ago, Arthur Smith, 36 years of age, the son of Charles Smith, committed suicide near here this morning by shooting himself through the heart with a 45-calibre revolver. The young man at first tried laudanum but was revived by his father.

The latter stepped out of the house for a moment and hearing a shot, hurried back to find his son had completed the work of self-destruction. The young man had stated on several occasions that he had received special messages from his mother telling him to come to her.

JAPANESE STRIKERS
RETURN TO WORK

Honolulu, July 13.—All of the Japanese laborers at the Waimale plantation, who struck yesterday and who made a demonstration against County Sheriff Jarrett when he arrested five of their leaders, returned to work today. Jarrett is returning to Honolulu after having withdrawn most of the large force of extra police that guarded the company's property during the night.

RANCHER COMMITS SUICIDE.

Miles City, Mont., July 13.—The body of Richard Samples, a Mizzpah rancher, was found Monday morning in a pastured twenty miles from town. H. W. Lowe, who has a sheep camp about a mile away. Samples left town in company with Jack Thompson and another man Sunday. He had been drinking and the wagon upset near where the corpse was found. His companions left him, as they were seen a couple of miles away while Samples was still wrestling with his overturned load. He evidently committed suicide from despondency, as a bullet hole was found over his left eye, together with many powder burns on his face.

BRYAN SAYS TARIFF
BILL IS A "BAD, BAD BILL"

Kansas City, July 13.—"The tariff bill is a bad bill—a bad, bad bill," said William J. Bryan in the course of an interview at the Union station here today on his way to Springfield, Mo. "But I am waiting. I am waiting to see what the Republican definition of the word 'revision' is. I know what the dictionary says about it. I suppose it should not have long to wait. But it is important to know."

Mr. Bryan said he believed there would be no new party because of the tariff situation. "If the people want tariff reform," said he, "they can get it through the Democratic party. Some Democrats are now misrepresenting the majority sentiment of their party, but they will not be able to control the party's action."

"Then it must be remembered that the rates for which the Democrats voted were very low rates and not at all to be compared with the high rates the Republican leaders have voted for or have supported. The Democrats did wrong, I think, in not voting for every reduction proposed."

ANTI-MORMON
BIGOTRY RAMPANTMinisterial Union of Humboldt
County, Cal., to Begin Campaign
Against Missionaries.

WILL ATTACK FROM PULPIT.

Rev. Peterson and Rev. Critchton,
Leaders of the Movement, Once
Residents of Salt Lake City.

Eureka, Cal., July 13.—At the meeting today of the Humboldt County Ministerial union, comprising in its membership virtually every orthodox minister in the county, it was decided to begin a campaign against the Mormon missionaries who have been working in this county for several weeks.

A committee composed of three ministers was appointed to conduct the campaign and all Protestant ministers were asked to attack the Mormon faith and literature from their pulpits.

The Reverend Peterson and the Reverend Critchton, who are leading the movement against the Mormon elders, were once missionaries in Salt Lake.

Two Mormon missionaries came to Humboldt county several weeks ago and began a systematic house to house canvass. They also made many public addresses, in which they urged their hearers to adopt the Mormon faith.

The Protestant ministers paid little attention to this work until a few days ago, when it was reported that the missionaries had found Humboldt county a fruitful field for their labors, and that many more exponents of Mormonism were to come from Utah to press the campaign for converts.

This report led the Ministers' association to take a hand, and vigorous action was decided upon to combat the spread of Mormonism in the county.

HEINZE'S MISSING BOOKS
DELIVERED TO AUTHORITIES

New York, July 13.—Two trunks, said to contain the missing books of F. Augustus Heinze and the United States Copper company, were turned over to the federal authorities in New York today. They were found, it is understood, in a house in West Fifty-ninth street.

From what can be learned, the books were first taken to a hotel at Spring Lake, N. J., then brought back to this city and shifted about until their discovery by a secret service agent today. United States Dist. Atty. Wise has been looking for the books in order to clear up the details of Heinze's alleged illegal loans, as president of the Mercantile National bank during the financial stringency of 1907.

TWO NEW ISLANDS
FOUND IN BERING SEA

Washington, July 13.—The destruction of two imposing mountain peaks, the transformation of a bay into a lake and the creation of two brand new islands, are the astonishing feats of nature discovered in Bering sea by a

government party and reported to the treasury department today.

A report received by Capt. Commandant Ross, of the revenue cutter service, says that a party from the revenue cutter Perry landed on Bogoslof island on June 12, last and found a number of changes had taken place. Perry peak and McCulloch peak have disappeared and the opening of the bay or lagoon, a pretty spot shown in pictures on file in the treasury department, has closed up, forming a lake of warm salt water, of sea level, and in its center two islands have sprung up. One of these islands is throwing off volumes of steam.

ALL DISCRIMINATION
IS NOT FORBIDDEN

Washington, July 13.—All discrimination is not forbidden by the act to regulate commerce, but only such discrimination as is undue. This, in effect, was a decision of the interstate commerce commission announced today in the case of the Horbreck-Demmer company against the Baltimore & Ohio railroad and the Pennsylvania railroad. The complainant has traveling salesmen who carry about 1,250 pounds of baggage, on all over 150 pounds of which they have to pay excess fare.

It was urged that when a railroad charged the same amount for carrying a passenger without baggage as it charged a passenger with 150 pounds of baggage, it was discriminating against the former in violation of the law. The commission held that the discrimination cited was not unlawful, that the railroads had a right to late the amount of baggage to be carried.

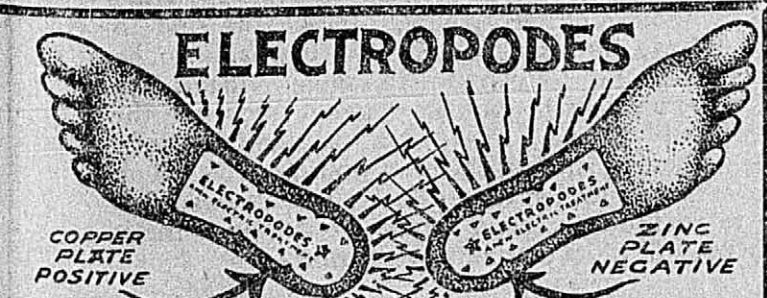
