CHICAGO. Chicago, July 6.-Following a bulge of more than one cent in the price of July delivery at the start the wheat market today settled into considerable weakness as a result of general selling based on an abundance of bearish news which had accumulated over the holidays. The crop report of Illinois. Missouri and Ohlo showed a marked improvement in the condition of the new crop and com-pletely off-set the effect of any delay to harvesting due to wet weather. Cover-ing by shorts caused the early advance in the July option. Prices at the opening were a shade lower to higher, July being at 1.14%. Corn was weak early in the session due to the favorable outlook for the new crop. The principal selling prossure was on the deferred months. July opened unchanged to 44 lower at ed94 to 6954 and for a time held within that range. Possible delay to harvesting operations owing to wet weather made a strong market for the distant deliveries of oats. July which opened firm soon eas-ed off, however, on profit-taking sell-ing off to 47%, after opening unchanged to 46, higher at 47% to 48. Minister of Commerce Cruppi on tariff revision with a motion to sus-pend further consideration of the tariff and invite the government to submit a bill which would safeguard France's political and economic interests with foreign countries. He insisted that the present parliament did not have a mandate for a general revision of the tariff, as in 1893, and he opposed meas-ures proposed by the tariff commission, which he said represented the "accu-mulated appetites of particular inter-ests" and constituted a menace to the export trade of France. This motion threw the ultra protec-tionists into a painic. M. Klobe and Morel and the members of the com-mission opposed the present bill was more moderate than if the verdict of the country at the forthcoming gen-eral elections was awaited, and they denied the proposals were conceived in a spirit of reprisal. In any case it was contended, France was not the aggressor, and in this respect the ac-tion of America was particularly cited. Foreign Minister Pichon here inter-rupted the debate to declare that France had not ceased to protest at Washington. "We must do more than protest," de-clared M. Klotz, "the general rate
