Let us compare this with other Take the Roman Catholics; we find that from distinctly if not exclusively Catholic countries, for

Germany and Switzerland sup-ply over 106,000, and of these there is probably one-half Roman Catholics, but not to over-estimate, let us say one-third are Romanists, which gives 35,333 of undoubted Catholics. Then Canada has certainly supplied over 25,000 Irish and French Catho. lics, and Mexico probably about 5000 This gives us a total Roman Catholic immigration to the United States for the fiscal year of 1888 of 212,000. The grand aggregate of immigration from all the countries of the world for the fiscal year of 1889 is 444,472. Hence we find that very nearly half of that immigration is unquestionable. Person Catholic Pha tlonably Roman Catholic. grand total of innulgration to the United States from 1875 to 1879 inclusive is 6,250,000, half of which is unquestionably Roman Catholic, so that the stimate furnished by Cardinal Gibbons of his followers (10,000,000) is not at all over-estimated; on the contrary, it is far under the real figures, when the prolific powers of that church are considered.

It may be said that Ireland supplies many Protestants which are included in the above, but England supplied an immigration of 68,000 for last half year, and we know that a large percentage of that is Catholic, entirely Irish of course. There are large colonies of Irish in the English cities, and the second gen-eration of the Irish there emigrate to America. Any way the matter is handled it will be found that half the immigration to the United States is Roman Catholic.

Compare your 1368 Mormons with your 212,000 Romanists for 1889 and try to suppress a smile if you can at Governor Thomas' dreadful apprehensions that these lew terrible Mormons will eat up the poor, innocent, gulleless, sinless followers of Leo XIII. There is about one Mormon to every 200 Romans, and when we add 200 of other sects, we find that this one Mormon will get away with 400 poor, honest Europeans unless Congress stops Mormon immigration. Of course I can't help com-mending the philanthropy of Governor Thomas for taking such interest in Leo XIII, and also in helping to protect Hungarians, Bohemians and Clan-ua-Gaels. I hope it is not treason to wish the governor a long and happy life for his Christian efforta.

The governor says the bulk of the Mormon immigration comes from England and Scandinavia. This is no laughing matter, and it is one of the Interior be warned in time of what is coming? 1,368 corrupt, demoralized, savage Englishmen and Swedes are going to destroy 212,000 Huns, Vandals and Clan-na-Gaels. Poor innocent babes!

Let us glance at religion in general in this country, and moralize a moment.

It is really alarming to contem-plate what horrors are ahead of us. Just fancy, 100,000 Mormons are going to swallow up the seventy or more religions of the United States with their 70,000,000 of followers.

## CURRENT TOPICS IN EUROPE.

cause of suffering humanity. In 1829, when nearly eighteen years of she was married to William of Prussia, who afterward became King William I of Prussla, and Emperor of Germany. During nearly four-fifths of her mar-ried life Prussia enjoyed the blessings of peace, and the late Empress-mother, under her successive titles of Princess William, Queen of Prussia and Empress of Germany, set an example of benevolence and philanthropy to German womanhood which bore ineswomanhood which bore ines-timable fruit during the seven momentous years when German unity was forming. The three sanguinary wars of 1864, 1866 and 1870 afforded German matrons and maidens an opportunity to prove how well they had profited by their royal teacher's instructions. The lessons the German officers learned during the great American Civil War developed a care for the sick and wounded soldiers such as had never been known in the history of European wars. Von Moltke found in the late Empress-mother an able helper to the sanitary condition of the German She became the self-aparmies. pointed supervisor and inspector of those sanitary measures which saved the life of many a brave warrior who had been wounded on the field of battle.

When in 1829 she was married to Prince William of Prussia, her reception in Berlin was the occasion of unwonted enthusiasm, and additional interest was added to the pageant by the fact that the Czar and Czarina of Russia came all the way from Warsaw to be present at the wedding. But for the gay cere-monies of the Capital she cared but little. On the other hand, her sympathies were ever alive to the sorrows of the poor and unfortunate. is worthy of remark that the diamond coronet which she as Princess William wore on the day of her marriage was the same one that was worn fifty-two years later by another Princess William as she knell at the altar with the Empress. mother's grandson, the present Emperor of Germany.

The late Empress-mother was not only a person of wonderful beauty but likewise of great intelligence; and to her German unity owes more than is generally conceded. her father in-law, King Frederick William of Prussia, was offered the crown of Germany hy the Diet of Frankfort, in 1848, he declined the honor, and it was only by her in-fluence that he at length became more favorable. Her opinious often clashed with those of Prince Bismarck, and it can now be said to her praise that her policy made Bis-marck famous in spite of himself, though he affects to resent all interference of women in politics. The Empress-mother lived to see the realization of her ideal of a United Germany, with Prussia at its head. She lived to share the Imperial throne with her husband, and her son and grandson succeed to this dream of her earlier years.
