Logan stated that for four years our meats have been excluded from France and Germany, and yet on examination by experts of all meats from different constries, ours proved the best. He knew some people did not believe in retaliatory legislation, but as far as he is concerned, he believed in it when necessary, and believed the time had come for the United States to say to France and Germany that their course of exclusion necessitates a corresponding exclusion on the part of the United States.
