## **REVISION OF** THE HOUSE RULES

Fight for it Begun at Meeting of The So-Called Republican Insurgents.

#### HEPBURN OF IOWA PRESIDED

Various Plans Proposed-All Expressions Regarding Speaker Cannon Were Friendly.

Washington, Dec. 11 .- The fight for a revision of the rules of the house was inaugurated tonight at a meeting of the so-called insurgents, attended by 25 Republican representatives. Reprosentative Hepburn if Iowa presided and was authorized to name a committee of five, with himself as chairman, to draft the proposed amendments to the rules and report to the organization.

The "insurgents" considered the various suggestions for more than two hours

Mr. Hepburn said the various plans proposed for changing the rules would be considered by the committee he would name. He desired to make it

would name. He desired to make it known that all the members invited to the meeting, with the exception of Representative Norris of Nebraska, who is out of town, were present. Those interested have been proceed-ing quietly with their plans, with the apparent purpose of increasing their numbers sufficiently to be able to con-trol the situation by joining the Demo-crats in a fight on the rules. The "in-surgents" claim that in the present Congress they need but 27 Republicans to join the Democrats in order to bring about a change in the rules, while in the Sixty-first Congress, they say, they the Sixty-first Congress, they say, they will need but 24 Republican members. Three of the representatives present tonight-Hepburn, Pollard and Ellis-will not be members of the next Con-

gress. While several of the insurgents are for Cannon for speaker, they made it plain that they greatly desired a change in the rules. "There were no expressions except those of friendly feeling for the speaker," said Mr. Hepburn after the meeting, "Nobody said anything against Mr, Cannon." He said the general feeling was that

He said the general feeling was that if under the rules the house must have a despotic leader, there was no one they would rather have than "Uncle Joe."

Several new suggestions, in addition to those already advanced, were made at the meeting. To increase the mem-bership of the rules committee of the house has been the most popular sug-gestion, and it has been proposed to have this committee elected by mem-bers of the house instead of being named by the speaker.

The election in a like manner of a committee of committees to perform duties similar to a like body in the senate also has been proposed by leaders in the movement. Another plan proposed is to set two Thursdays apart each month for the consideration of bills in the house calendar, and the re-maining Thursdays for the considera-tion of measures on the union calendar. None of those present would state whether it was intended to bring the matter to an issue in the present ses-sion of Congress. Congress. Among those present were McKinley and Hayes, of California.

At yesterday's conference Mr. Tart did not discuss any particular tariff schedules, but expressed the desire to take up certain schedules at some fu-ture conference. He also favored any action on the part of the committee which would bring to the front those manufacturers who have expressed their views publicly on the tariff question, as well as any persons who could furnish valuable information in connection with the proposed revision. Chairman Payne said tonight that Andrew Carnegie is the only witness subpoenaed up to this time and it there-fore undoubtedly will be necessary for the committee to hold further hearings after the Christmas recess. ### SUICIDE TO CAPTURE

ON MURDERED MAN

Plains, Mont., Dec. 11 .- Closely pursuerd by a sheriff's posse, and evidently driven to desperation through lack of food and sleep, Robert Smith, slayer of Clarence Clark, near, Victor last Monday, fired a shot into his own brain this morning two miles west of Eddy. When found by mill hands Smith was still alive, but died shortly afterwara while being taken to the hospital at Thompson Falls. Near where the body lay was a .3 caliber revolver with all the chambers empty, and on the man's person was found a notebook containing the following memorandum: "Name. Robert Smith. I killed Clar-ence Clark at Victor, Montana." Sheriff Massey of Ravalli county posi-tively identified the body as that of the man wanted for the killing of Clark.
