PACKEY MCFARLAND TELLS ORDERED TO COMMIT SUICIDE OR LEAVE

Patrolman Tells Dying Man to The Head in Sack and Jump Into City Creek.

"If you don't get out of town b 2 o'clock this afternoon, tie your head in a sack with a heavy rock and jump into City creek."

This was the advice given this morning by Patrolman M. J. Lyon to Robert Higgs, a hop-head who is suf-fering from consumption and a loath-some disease and in bad physical condition

some disease and in bad physical con-dition. Higgs was arrested a couple of days ago for vagrancy and yesterday after-noon was given a floater, or until 2 o'clock this afternoon to isave the city. Patrolman Lyon found him on North Temple street this morning and placed him under arrest. The man was so unkept and dirty it was difficult to tell what was his natural color. When brought to the station it was learned that he had until 2 o'clock to leave town and it was then that Lyon gave him the advice to jumy into the creek. The police are now speculating whether or not the unfortunate will leave Salt Lake or commit suicide.
