In our various teachings in Sanpete county we laid before the people the principles of the United Order, as made known in the Scriptures and the Book of Mormon, as revealed by Joseph Smith in the Book of Doctrine and Covenants, and the late developments by President Brigham Young. We told them to use prudence and caution in the selection of their own officers, choosing the most trustworthy, honorable and competent men to fill those various offices, and to have their appointees ready, and that when we returned we would again call at the several settlements, hold meetings and organize them in the United Order; and thus they would have time to reflect and deliberate, and select the most suitable persons.

On the 21st we proceeded to Gunnison, and preached in the evening.

From thence we proceeded to Richfield, in Sevier county, at which place we had the pleasure of meeting Joseph A. Young, President of that district, who bade us welcome to his house.
