

WAS NOT ALLOWED TO PLEAD GUILTY.

Murderer Rose Arraigned in Court This Morning—Soren X. Christensen Appointed to Defend.

HE ASKED THE COURT FOR HELP

Accordingly Atty. D. N. Straup Was Also Named as Counsel for Defense—Faller in Court.

Although apparently ready and anxious to enter a plea of guilty to the charge of murdering his wife, Frank Rose was this morning denied that privilege by Judge Stewart, in the criminal division of the district court, when he was arraigned upon the charge of murder in the first degree.

Rose said that he did not want an attorney, but the court was of a different opinion and appointed Attorneys Soren X. Christensen and D. N. Straup to defend the man.

On next Monday morning at 10 o'clock Rose will again appear in court and will enter a plea to the charge. He, in company with five other prisoners, was brought into court this morning by Deputy Sheriffs Cowan, Sharp and Husted.

Attorneys Appointed. Owing to the fact that Judge Morse had not returned from Kansas, Judge Stewart was called in to arraign the prisoners.
