OWNED KINGS AND QUEENS.

MANY CHAMPIONS

Table Showing Wonderful Horses Owned at One Time by Big Turfman-Some of the Records.

The retirement of C. K. G. Billings from the light harness sport has brought to an end a remarkable career for one fond lover of the horse, says a dispatch from Cleveland. When Mr. Billings turned his fine, large stable at Glenville over to Charles Tanner recently, a very different lot of horses were placed in this "stable for champions," as the stable could well be referred to when Mr. Billings was deeply associated with the light harness game. From now on the caliber of horses to be placed in this barn will not be a cheap lot, not by any means, but it is hardly expected that ever again will one

cheap lot, not by any means, but it is hardly expected that ever again will one man own so many champions as Mr. Bill-ings and had them all stabled in one barn at one time or the other. To give some idea or the high class lot of breeders this New York gentleman owned at one time can be jilnstrated in part by the fact that upon one visit to dienville Mr. Billings rode (litrix-seven heats one day better than 2.15, and at least twenty of those were better than 2.10. That is a record to be shot at, but it is feared that it will go unharmed for many years to come, as such feats are as scarce as fair weather this spring. Doe Tanner had charge of every one of these spritted fivers that were stabled at Glenville, and it was due in no small degree to the careful attention and expert training these hores were given that made it possible for them to show go much speed. To start with, Mr. Billings owned the trotting queen, Lou Dillon, and the king of all the geldings, Major Delmar, the only two trotters up to date that have stepped a mile below the two-minute stable.

stepped a mile below the two-minute mark. Low Dillon holds the world's record of 1335 to sulky, while she has a mark of 250 to wagon and 205 to high wheels. Major Delmar, the world's champion gelding, has a record of 13594 to sulky. 2535 to wagon, and has been a half-mile in one minute flat. These two speed merchants may never be able to cut an-other fraction from their mark again, as Lon Dillon has been retired to the stud, and it is hardly expected that Major Del-mar, speedy as he is, will be able to beat two minutes in the future. This rotter may surprise mome people this season, however, as he will be trained by Alta McDonald and may show better form than is anticipated. In view of the remarkable stable of horses Mr. Billings has had a table showing the horses that he has owned given below.
