

## Our Country Contemporaries

Ogden Junction, Dec. 9—

Eight heavily loaded teams with barley for Salt Lake came down from North Ogden to-day.

The Evanston Age says Billy Foster and J. B. Parker had a dispute at that place about a debt last Saturday evening, when Parker shot at Foster and the latter shot at Parker twice, one shot going through his hand and the other through his abdomen. Dr. Harrison took out the ball on the side opposite to where it entered. He cannot tell yet if it will prove fatal.

Mr. James Horrocks presented his claim on the County Court of Weber County for services as Grand Juror, and promptly received an order on the Treasurer for the amount of services under the Territorial statutes. He had previously received pay from the Government for six days' services under the Statutes of the U. S. On presenting his order to the Treasurer this morning, he received his pay in greenbacks.

We read in an exchange some particulars relating to Thomas Ford, the Governor of Illinois, who pledged his protection to Joseph and Hyrum Smith, and then left them exposed to the murderous attack of a mob with their faces blackened. A lady was invited to attend a Methodist church at Peoria, Illinois, and noticing a rough box or coffin resting under the pulpit, enquired concerning it, and was informed that it enclosed the remains of the wife of ex-Gov. Ford, and was supplied at the public expense. Ford was present, and he looked gaunt and miserable, and his bones appeared ready to pierce through the skin.

Two weeks later the lady attended again, and was astonished to see a similar coffin in the same place. It contained all that was left of Gov. Ford, who had for some time lived, and had now died, a pauper.

The lady who saw this, though she had left the "Mormon" church, remembered hearing Elder John Taylor say in Nauvoo, that "Gov. Ford would live until the flesh would wither from his bones and he would die a pauper."

Beaver Enterprise, Dec. 5.—

We learn by letter from Bro. Dame, to his folks at Parowan, that he is confined in the same room of the Penitentiary as the one occupied by Col. T. E. Ricks. He says four others (strangers) are also in the same room; that he is in good health; has engaged the legal services of Messrs. Sutherland & Bates in his behalf, and they intend to press for an early trial, which we hope our court here will grant, that men like Bishop Dame, who never moved one step out of the way to evade the officers of the law, and have less fear of justice than their accusers, may have the benefit of vindicating their character, meeting every point set down against them in a legal, fair trial, and adjudged by his peers and his countrymen.

There are two prominent individuals, well known to the citizens of Iron County who, for years spent their time on the Cedar City and Parowan valley ranges and from their boyhood up till to-day have been familiar with every remote spring and watering place, canon and favorite grazing range of every herd of cattle and band of horses.

This band have had their riders and hunters, their spies and herders, the latter of whom were comprised of young boys, expert with the lasso, and apprentices at cow, cattle and horse herding for years previous.

Indictments were found against members of this band of thieves by the grand jury of this district court last winter. Two arrests were made, and preliminary investigations resulted in one of the parties being released in consequence of informality in papers, but who was afterwards indicted the second time for grand larceny and is now under bonds for his appearance at this term. The other individual, lacking in every quality of manhood and honor, by some means, obtained bonds; was permitted to carry on the business to which he served such a faithful apprenticeship, namely, killing and selling stolen beef in Nevada, till the limited date of his bonds when he should have put in his appearance, but fled to the interior of Nevada like a cowardly hound from justice, leaving his bondsmen in the lurch and distressed.

## Books Received.

We are indebted to the Messrs. Lippincott & Co., publishers, of Philadelphia, for a copy of their new and revised edition of Prescott's work, the history of "Philip the Second," in three volumes. The reign of this monarch presents far more than ordinarily attractive elements and materials for the pen of the able historian, as it occurred at a period which may be justly considered as the great turning point in the history of modern Europe and of civilization itself. The mental bondage, under which the people of Europe had so long labored was then being burst by the mighty influences of the Protestant Reformation, which shook the church of Rome to its foundation, and rendered it, for all time to come, comparatively powerless over the minds and actions of the masses; and taken as a whole, the events which occurred during the reign of Philip—the most powerful sovereign in Europe—can not but be regarded as among the most momentous in the entire history of civilization and of Christendom.

Philip was the son of the famous Charles the Fifth, Emperor of Germany, and King of Spain and the Netherlands, who, when Philip was twenty-eight years old, abdicated in his favor, so far as the sovereignty of Spain and the Netherlands was concerned, thus rendering that young prince not only ruler of the foremost power in Europe, but of the most extensive dominion then under one sceptre in the world.

Philip the Second was a most devout son of the church, or, in other words, an intensely bigoted Catholic, and his zeal for extending the power and influence of Catholicism is said to have surpassed that which he manifested for increasing the power and enlarging the dominions of the Spanish crown. One saying attributed to him is that it was better not to reign at all than to reign over heretics, that is, those not of the Catholic faith. With a man of this turn of mind, possessing almost unlimited power, it is easy to understand that religious intolerance and persecution would be inevitable, for the influences of the Reformation were quickly felt in every country in Europe, Spain and the Netherlands not excepted; and during the reign of this sovereign the *Auto-de-fe* flourished in the former, while in the latter the cruelties and outrages practiced on the people by the authority of Philip were perhaps never surpassed if ever equalled in the history of the world. The struggles of the brave Netherlands for civil and religious freedom, under their noble leaders, foremost among whom was William the Silent, Prince of Orange, form one of the most thrilling chapters of history in all times. The principles promulgated by Luther early took deep root in Holland, and the course of the people, under the impulse excited by their new faith, excited the ire of Philip to the highest degree, and for their contumacy his Dutch subjects were consigned to the tender mercies of ten thousand brutal soldiers, led by the Duke of Alva, one of the greatest generals of his age, and one of the most bloodthirsty and cruel men mentioned in history's pages. This wretch was Viceroy of the Netherlands for six years, and during that period he inflicted the most unheard of atrocities upon the people, putting nearly 19,000 to death by executions, besides the unnumbered thousands killed in battles and sieges.

It was during the reign of Philip the Second that the so-called "Invincible Armada" was sent to invade England, after the refusal of Elizabeth to accept the hand of Philip in marriage; he also waged wars with France, Turkey and Italy, and taken in their entirety the events of this reign have rendered it one of the most famous in the brilliant history of the Spain of centuries ago, the recital of which, in the hands of Prescott, forms one of the most authentic and popular historical works ever presented to the public. Speaking of the new and revised edition of this history, mechanically, only terms of praise can be used: it is all but faultless. It is elegantly bound, printed in beautiful type, on fine stout paper, and contains steel portraits of Philip and the notables of his court.
