

WANT BEAUTY OF CANYON SAVED

Citizens Strongly Protest Against Appropriation of Ogden River By Utah Light & R'y Co.

W. S. A. COMMENCEMENT.

County Jail and Prisoners Searched With Tell Tale Results—Death of Mrs. Marion Mitchell of Clinton.

Ogden, May 24.—The meeting of the Ogden Civic Improvement league held last evening for the purpose of getting expression from the citizens concerning the application of the Utah Light & Railway company to place a pumping system on the Ogden river was largely attended and many vigorous protests against the proposition were made by prominent citizens. The meeting was presided over by J. S. Lewis, and it was the sentiment of the public in general concerning the matter is to be judged from the utterances of last evening, then the application should be promptly denied. Among the prominent gentlemen who spoke on the matter were August Wright, William G. Wilson, J. S. Lewis and others. The speakers voiced a strong opposition to the application. After the speech making the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That a resolution of remonstrance be drafted against the granting of the application for certain water right in Ogden canyon, to the Utah Light & Railway company.

The president will name a committee to prepare the resolutions and to present the same before the board of directors of the Utah Light & Railway company. The Utah Light & Railway company is desirous of establishing a pumping system on the Ogden river near the present dam site to pump the waters of the river into its pipe line for power purposes. It is claimed by those opposed to the application that if granted the power company would pump the river practically dry during certain seasons and thus greatly diminish the natural beauty of the canyon, which today is one of the most magnificent places in the west.

COUNTY JAIL SEARCHED.

Razors and Other Dangerous Instruments Found.

Ogden, May 24.—Sheriff Sebring yesterday surprised the prisoners at the Weber county jail by deciding on a thorough search of the jail cells and their clothing. For days past the sheriff has suspected that the prisoners, some of whom are bad characters, had concealed in the jail that was against the rules, so he had all the men taken from their cells and with his deputies he searched the places and found to his astonishment razors, pocket knives, wire springs, sometimes used to make saws to saw iron rods, etc. Just how the prisoners secured these things is a mystery to the officers. It is presumed visitors to the jail have smuggled the property in to the prisoners.

DEATH OF MRS. MITCHELL.

In the death yesterday afternoon of Mrs. Marion Mitchell, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Thomas Parker, at Clinton, Davis county, the community lost one of its most prominent citizens and the Latter-day Saints one of the most faithful and active workers.

The summons from mortality came very unexpectedly. She had been enjoying comparatively good health until yesterday morning, when she was stricken with a paralytic stroke, and although a physician was summoned from Ogden and all that loving hands could do for her was done, she gradually weakened until the end came.

She was born in Denmark April 1, 1847, was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jens Christensen. When 18 years of age she emigrated to Utah, and has lived in Weber and Davis counties ever since.

She was one of the most active workers in the Clinton ward. For over 15 years she had been president of the Relief society and for more than 25 years was a prominent worker in the Sabbath schools and other organizations, and was a mother to the entire ward. Her death was a great loss to the community, and her funeral services will be held Sunday at 10:30 at the Clinton, Davis county, meetinghouse. Her interment will take place in the Ogden city cemetery.

LIVELY RUNAWAY.

A lively runaway occurred on Twenty-fifth street yesterday afternoon, when a team belonging to Corey's livery stable, which was attached to a three-seated vehicle in which sat the six palebearers, at the W. G. Lamoree's funeral, on their return from the depot, became unmanageable and dashed eastward on Twenty-fifth street. The horses got the bits in their teeth and ran for more than 150 yards before they were stopped by two men pulling on the lines. The vehicle collided with several rigs before reaching Washington avenue, where it was stopped, resulting in considerable damage. The occupants, who did not jump were considerably shaken up, but all escaped without serious injury.

NARROW ESCAPE FROM DEATH.

George McDonald Loses Team and Wagon in Valeo River.

Heber, Wasatch Co., May 23.—George McDonald of Heber, who had a narrow escape from death yesterday morning while attempting to cross the Valeo river bridge about a mile and a half north of the town, as he was lost a fine span of horses and a new wagon. Mr. McDonald was coming from the Valeo Lease with a load of ore and when in the center of the bridge he felt it beginning to sink and ran ahead of the team. The team and wagon went into the stream and were quickly swept away. The part of the bridge upon which Mr. McDonald was standing was swept down the river for some distance before he was able to land. His loss is in the neighborhood of \$600.

SEVIER COUNTY VALUATIONS.

Increase of \$61,466 Over 1906—In the Justice's Court—News Briefs.

Richfield, Sevier Co., May 23.—The county assessor has just completed his assessment for 1907. The total value of property in Sevier county is \$2,372,155. As compared with last year there is an increase of \$61,466. His report shows the following: Number of acres farming land, 139,112, value \$106,483; town lots, \$185,975; improvements, \$426,245; number of mining claims, five, value \$3,100; cattle \$206,266; horses, \$139,562; sheep, \$106,086; personal property, \$441,048. The county board of equalization will meet on June 3, 4, 5 and 6.
