Rabbi Freund Makes Out Case Against Parties Attacking Jewish Race.

The ancient case between Jew and Anti-Semite received elaborate treatment in a sermon last night preached by Rabbi Charles J. Freund of the Temple B'nai Israel. Racial traits of the Jew, which have figured in the anti-Semitic charges, were gone into

At length, and a case was made for the Jew in which the attacks against him were found to be groundless, and the responsibility for them was placed on the attacking parties. "There is no gainsaying the fact," he said, "that the Jew is a disliked individual. Right along, even to the living present, the Jew has been made the scapegoat of ignorance and senseless accusations. The God-given privilege of living has been made a hard process as charge upon charge has been made that selfishness and greed were the only motives that dominated him."

"Exploitation and resultant selfishness cannot be charged up against the Jew. But more often a disinterested desire to help others as much as possible was consistently proper. When we make the assertion that Jews more often give to Christian charity work than vice-versa, an ulterior motive may readily be sought and ascertained. It is not the desire to win public approval and also better trade that makes the possibility of such charitable work. The charge of selfishness is a cruel one to make in many instances of an almost daily occurrence of unostentatious giving can be the effective answer of refutation."

"And then the anti-Semite is only too ready to charge that the Jew is so miserably avaricious and greedy for money. This is no more of a Jewish failing than it is a common human trait. Money was only sought for, and if of necessity hoarded, because it represented power. It was an ally that the Jew could with propriety enlist in his efforts to maintain himself."

"As a summation of it all, our answer to the anti-Semite is that the Jew will simply and unostentatiously strive to perform his duty in and by doing the best thing to do will be to have more and more of Judaism—to practise in daily life its grand teachings and noble ideals. Doing this, we can not but gain the respect and regard of the world. For ourselves in doing this we can but say, 'Fear ye not, O Israel.'"
