## LOCAL BRIEFS.

Edward Bokman, formerly of Sweden has been admitted to citizenship by Judge Armstrong.

Local veterinarians report that the Pink Eye disease which was epidemic among horses six weeks ago, has disappeared, and that the equine health in general could hardly be bettered.

The acting secretary of the D. A. & M. society wishes the parties to whom diplomas and medals from the late state fair are due would either send or call for the same, and thus take them off his hands.

The Y. M. C. A. used a reflector-scope in posting the election returns at association headquarters for the benefit of the public. This device is new in this part of the country, and is very simple and effective.

Night Clerk C. L. Mayhew of the Southern hotel, broke his leg Tuesday night, while watching the election returns, by catching his foot in the crowd as the crowds surged against him. He is at the Holy Cross hospital.

**NEW CEMENT WORKS.**  
Rocky Mountain Company Will Incorporate With 500,000 Capital.

The Rocky Mountain Portland Cement company of this city will incorporate in a few days with \$500,000 capital, and \$250,000 worth of 7 per cent bonds will be issued to provide for the erection of the plant. The output will be from 100 to 500 barrels per day, giving employment to 100 men. Salt Lake City used 145,000 bags of cement during 1904 for sidewalk construction alone. The company will locate at Pascoe's quarry, north of Warm Springs, where the railroad and water facilities are excellent. Among the promoters of the enterprise are Senator Hamberger, A. Hanover and J. A. Cunningham.
