----PORTERVILLE. PROGRESS IN TEN YEARS.

Porterville Has New Meeting and Schoolhouse-Other Improvements.

special Correspondence. Porterville, Morgan Co., July 2 -- Porterville is a small town in the southern part of Morgan county, four or five part of Morgan county, four or nice niles from the milway, and is situated on East Canyon creek. It has been making rapid stildes in the last decade. The first of importance occured in 1957, when the two wards, East and West Parterville, were consolidated. Less than a year later the construction of a contraction between and berow 35 by 75 than a year later the construction of a ward meetinghouse was begun, 35 by 76 feet in dimensions with heavy rock wall hasement. The structure is a fine one and cost about \$5,000. It is situated midway between the East and West sides, on an elevated spot, overlooking the valley below, and is by far the fin-est ward house in the county. The next mode is importance was the building of a modern schoolhouse, costing \$4,500. The district was bouled for \$3,000. \$1,600 was raised by special tax, and \$100 was realized from sale of

tax, and \$300 was realized from sale of old school buildings and sites. This building, crected in 1903, with its hotair heating device, is second best in the county, and with W. E. Archibald of Ogden as principal teacher, the school has been doing good work. The next and latest public improve-ment, one iong needed, and much ap-precised by the general public, was the moving of the county road running over the hill just north of East Por-terville.
