The race will be about 300 miles, and will be held in June over the ramous Tau-nus course, which was used for the Gordon Bennett race of 1804. It has always been considered one of the best racing courses in Europe. At first it was planned to use only a portion of the original dreuit, employing a cut-off which would result in a lap of about 50 miles. The unexpectedly large number of entries has caused it to be proposed that the original course with a lap of 36 miles be adhered to 0n the small course, with cars dispatched every minute, the leading carwenld arrive for its second lap long before the last car of the batch had been sent away for its first lap.

Very respectable and representative is the list of entrants, which has just closed. Seven countries are represented Germany leading with 21 cars; France second, with 21; Italy just behind, with 20; Beligium next, with nine entries; England fifth, with four cars entered, and Austria and Switzerland dividing last place, with three each. The grand total is 31.

The presence of the Austrian Mercedes, a gaseline car which converts the power into electricity and applies it through electric motors, will be something of great interest, as such a car has never appeared in a race before.

A large amount of interest is being taken in the Kalser's Cup, and to promote still greater, L'Auto, a prominent French motoring paper, has offered a cup to the French car finishing first. This example was immediately followed by The Autocar, an English paper, which has announced that it will present a cup to the first English car to finish.

President Eliot Defends System in Vogue in the South.

Boston, Feb. 14.—President Eliot of Harvard university, President Frost of Berea college, Kentucky, and the Right Rev. William Lawrence. Episcopal bishop of Washington. speaking before the Twentieth Century club tonight, expressed themselves as being more or less in favor of separate public schools for negroes. President Eliot defended the separate school system of the south and said that the 30 colored students now at Harvard are not enough to make an influence for evil on the student hass of the university. He said, however, that if the number increased to any extent he should favor a separation.
