age continuing throughout the country. It praises President Palma, and declares his work to be benevolent and beneficial. It expresses the opinion that it is proper for President Palma to continue at the head of the government, as otherwise control would be lacking. Regarding his re-election the letter says that even had the Liberals voted he would have been elected, not only because he was a capable candidate, but because he had been the first president of the republic and had governed with the approval of all. Concerning the election of congressmen and senators, and provincial officers, a good solution would be the resignation of all those elected in 1906, with the exception of President Palma. The commission recommended that the new elections be held Jan. 1, 1907.

The commissioners say they believe President Palma was moved by patriotic motives in governing during his second term with a partisan government, which ordinarily is wise under a constitutional government, but unwise in Cuba, where the only differences between political parties are personalities. For this reason, and respecting the lofty motives of the president, the commissioners advise him to rule with the help of all parties and to accept the resignations which his secretaries are anxious to present. been instructed by the Moderate assembly to draft a reply to Secy. Taft's letter to President Palma, in which peace terms were suggested. After this interview Secy. Mendez Capote said to the Associated Press:

"I have resigned irrevocably my position as vice president of the republic. I resigned because the resignation of President Palma was forced upon him by causes determined to the dignity and decorum of the office of chief executive. The president will convene congress in extraordinary session on Friday to consider his resignation and my own."

Mendez Capote said further that the entire body of Moderates in both houses, as well as the entire Liberal National, or Nunez party, would refrain from attending the extraordinary session. As the Moderates and the Nationalists comprise more than two-thirds of each house, there will be no quorum. This still block action and prove that the structure of constitutional government no longer exists.

Mendez Capote emphatically condemned the alleged partiality of the American commissioners, and said he expressed the opinion of many of the members of his party when he declared that Secy. Taft and Bacon had placed themselves unreservedly on the side of the Liberals, and against the existing recognized government. He said that, even had they accepted the basis of peace first presented by the mediators, he did not think the island could have remained at peace for 20 days.

Mendez Capote has called another meeting of the Moderates for Thursday to determine the attitude of the party toward the approaching extraordinary session of congress.

While the developments recorded today are profoundly serious, the outward appearance of things was distinctly peaceful. This was the quietest day yet at the American legation, where the commissioners have been holding their hearings. There was comparatively few callers, but there was a constant interchange of cablegrams with Oyster Bay over a direct wire from the legation to the cable office.

These communications were a result of the notification from President Palma that he had decided to resign and had terminated to resign rather than submit to the terms suggested, and the fact that they declined to offer any modifications to these terms.

The formal draft of the terms, sent to the palace early this morning, was rejected at noon. This action was not expected by Secy. Taft, notwithstanding the fact that it had been threatened by certain of the government officials, and it practically caused him to abandon his efforts toward a settlement that would continue the sovereignty of the republic.

Although intervention appears to be certain, both Secys. Taft and Bacon assured the Associated Press that such a course would not be taken so long as a government remains with which they can treat, but in face of the personal communication from President Palma that he is about to throw over the whole matter, Secy. Taft has no great expectation that the present government will endure for long.

Secy. Taft feels that President Palma's course is unwise for, as the letter setting forth the terms of peace invited the government to suggest changes in the conditions unsatisfactory to them, and in fact to offer any other plan which they believed would be acceptable to all concerned.

Secy. Taft feels keenly that President Palma has been insincere in the negotiations with the American commissioners, in that he had entered upon the negotiations with the voluntary promise to abide by the decision of the commissioners and then rejected the very first suggestion made, and also refused to offer any counter plans. This convinced Secy. Taft that President Palma intended to accept only in the event that the decision favored the existing government, and when Palma saw that he intended to resign, he was further convinced that the president of Cuba would wreck the government of the republic rather than make personal or party sacrifices.

The American commissioners decided not to keep their engagement to resign President Palma, because of his attitude today.

Secy. Taft added that the terms agreed upon retain Palma as president, but he had listened to the bad counsel of his cabinet ministers. The situation here has been called to President Roosevelt.

Secy. Taft sent the written conditions to Senator Mendez Capote, as president of the Moderate party, for consideration by himself and Senator Doiz, president of the senate. The secretary requested Mendez Capote to give him an answer today. Senator Zayas, the Liberal leader, informed the Associated Press today that yesterday there were nine points of difference between the Liberals and the American commissioners, but he regarded these as being easily adjusted. This morning Mr. Taft revised the terms decided upon in order to meet the desires of the insurgents, and Senator Zayas took a draft of them to the presidio, to be considered by the whole committee.

This afternoon Senator Zayas informed the Associated Press that there were two main points upon which the Liberals must insist, one of them being a practical enforcement of the dissolution of the armed forces, and the other being general amnesty for all participants in the revolution.

President Roosevelt has cabled President Palma appealing to the latter's patriotism to accept the terms suggested by Messrs. Taft and Bacon as being the only conditions under which calm conditions can be restored.

The letter sent by Messrs. Taft and Bacon to President Palma and the members of the cabinet was lengthy and carefully and diplomatically worded, with the intention of arousing the Cuban president's co-operation in a settlement on the terms suggested through appealing to his patriotism. Besides setting forth the terms of the proposed agreement the commissioners expressed the warmest appreciation of President Palma's well known life ambition, that Cuba continue an independent republic, and appealed to him to do all possible to aid the peace commissioners in carrying out the task set them by President Roosevelt.

LE DOUX MURDER CASE.

Stockton, Cal., Sept. 25.—The bill of exceptions in the case of Emma LeDoux, convicted of the murder in this city last March of Albert N. McVicar, by poisoning him and placing his body in a trunk, was filed today by the attorney for the prisoner. It comprises 800 typewritten pages, and covers more than 250 exceptions to the rulings of the court. It has been referred to the prosecution for amendment and revision pending its submission to the supreme court on a motion for a new trial.

AN ITALIAN MURDERED.

Los Angeles, Sept. 25.—Joseph Cucu, an Italian, was shot and killed while driving along North Main street this afternoon. The murderer was mounted on a bicycle, and escaped those who witnessed the shooting and who immediately started in pursuit. Cucu was driving a buggy when a young man rode up behind the vehicle on a bicycle and fired three bullets into Cucu's back. Cucu was killed instantly and his horses ran away, throwing the body out two blocks from the scene of the shooting. There is no clue to the murderer.

MAGOON COMING HOME.

Panama, Sept. 25.—Charles E. Magoon, the retiring American minister to Panama, left today for Washington. The press expressing public sentiment deplores the departure of Minister Magoon and says he leaves behind him only friends. Joseph W. Lee, the American minister to Ecuador, and Thomas W. Cooke, collector of the revenues in the canal zone, also left here today.

DON'T NEED TO INSPECT IMPORTED MEATS.

Washington, Sept. 25.—A decision has been reached by the department of justice that the meat inspection law recently enacted by Congress does not apply to foreign meat products shipped into this country. The question was raised by importers of foreign meats and meat products. The department of agriculture held that the law applied to these products and permitted inspectors of the department of agriculture to pass on them practically as they should pass on domestic meat products. The question, however, was referred to the department of justice for an opinion. The opinion was prepared several days ago and submitted to Atty-Gen. Moody. He concurred, it is understood, in the opinion prepared by the department.

The acting secretary of commerce and labor today promulgated certain rules regarding the exportation of meats and meat products, prescribing the manner of inspecting carcasses and the issuance of certificates, labels, etc.

The rules require that both the original and duplicate certificates shall be delivered to the exporter, who shall file the original with the cus-

tom officers and the duplicate with the consignee, to be used by the latter in identifying the shipment at the point of destination by comparison with the original.

Clearance is to be denied to any vessel carrying meat products for exportation where regulations have not been strictly complied with.

The new rules go into effect Oct. 1.

BOLIVAR DOLLAR DIES.

Boynton and Thompson Discharged.

Though Had Them in Possession.

New York, Sept. 25.—Capt. George E. Boynton of South America and Lewis M. Thompson, a lawyer of this city, today were discharged from custody by a United States commissioner before whom they had been arraigned on a charge of having in their possession hubs and let for the production of the "Bolivar" silver dollar of Venezuela. Counsel for the defendants contended that the federal statutes made a distinction between the possession of dies to counterfeit United States coin and the money of another country, arguing that proof must be established that it was intended to engage in the counterfeiting within the jurisdiction of the United States. The commissioner upheld this contention and as the prisoners showed that they had planned to make their coins in the dolls of the Orinoco case was dismissed.

EX-PUGILIST GOES INSANE.

For More Than an Hour Jack Scott Holds up People With a Rifle.

Los Angeles, Sept. 25.—Jack Scott, a former pugilist and ex-Spanish war volunteer, who was severely wounded in the Philippines campaign, went suddenly insane tonight at the garage at Seventh and Broadway streets where he was employed as a chauffeur and for more than an hour terrorized the people with a rifle and a long barreled Colt's revolver. He was at length overpowered by the police and locked up.

With the cocked gun at his shoulder the madman held up one after another half a dozen persons who entered the garage and cunningly prevented them from telephoning for help. He then, holding his rifle in one hand and his revolver in the other, entered the bar of the Lankehlshim hotel, adjoining, and attempted to capture that place. One of the bartenders, unarmed, knocked Scott down and threw him into the street.

The crazy man retired to the garage. A special officer, gun in hand followed and tried to disarm him. Scott took the officer's weapon away and ran him out. Another man then tried to dispose of the wild man by running him down with an automobile, but was forced to back his machine from the garage at the point of the rifle.

Finally the police arrived and forced their way through an immense crowd that had collected and overpowered Scott, though he fought desperately. Examination showed that the Winchester was not loaded.
