SALT LAKE CITY ENJOINED

Another Effort Made to Prevent Impounding of the Waters of Utah Lake.

Bates Trial and Other Court Matters-Municipal and County Affairs Weddings Galore.

Provo, Utah County, Dec. 4.-Yesterday Judge Booth issued an injunction against Salt Lake City, the Utah and Salt Lake Canal company, the South rdan Canal company, the North Joran Canal company and the East Jor-

dan Canal company and the East sor-dan Canal company, upon the applica-tion of George T. Peay of Provo.

Mr. Peay in his petition for the in-junction sets forth that he is the owner of 725 acres of land adjoining the shores of Ulah lake, the surface of which is only a few few above the which is only a few feet above the water of the said lake in its normal and natural condition. It is also alleged that by the defendants' placing planks and other artificial obstructions such a height that the plaintiff's home and land will be flooded to such an extent as to cause great damage to plaintiff's property.


