The assertion is made that if the suits are pressed the party will be ruined in Colorado, and the reign of honest m-n inaugurated, a consummation most earnestly to be desired by the people who have been so abused and outraged by Schaffenburg and Com pany. Petitions for and against Schaffenburg are to be presented to President Grant during his visit to Denver, and it is to be hoped that his decision will be in favor of right, of which there is no doubt if he can only learn the truth.


