From the Canadian circuit will come William Garth, Thomas Clyde, P. N. Civill, J. E. Instraham, James Carruthers, Wil-instields and others. Also some of the first class jockeys will be here. They include Vincent Powers, E. Martin, Tap-lin, S. Page, J. Lee, A. English, Mc-Carthy, Schilling and Goldstein. # PAULL, PENN'S GREAT RUNNER. ESTABLISHING NEW MARK

## FOR MILE.

William Paull, Pennsylvania's great sprinter, made a phenomenal run in the recent track meet in Cambridge, Mass., when he captured the mile event after a sensational struggle in 4 minutes 174-5 seconds. The new mark shattered the intercollegiate and collegiate record of 4 minutes 203-5 seconds made by Guy Haskins of the red and blue squad in the championships of 1907. Although the time made by Pennsylvania's man was a shade slower than that hung up almost 14 years ago by Tommy Conneff, Paull has the honor of stepping the fastest mile ever covered by an American born citizen, for Conneff, although a loyal son of Uncle Sam, first saw the light of day in the Emerald Isle. Penn's great runner, however, gives promise of ability to lower Conneff's figures, for in his recent race he made he running all the way, and had no one to extend him on the last furlong. If Paull had been pushed he undoubtedly would have equilled or cracked Conneff's figures. Paull finished comparatively fresh and after a short rest went out and finished a close second to his teammate, Beck, in a 1 minute 563-5 seconds half mile.
