FELL OVER EMBANKMENT.

Thrilling Accident in Ogden Canyon-Narrow Escape of Mr. and Mrs. Lightfoot.

They encountered another automobile a short distance farther down, which had stopped close to the edge of the embankment in or der to let the Lightfoot party pass Suddeny the horse became frightened and dashed over the brink of the embankment, taking the vehicle and its occupants with it. The animal soon broke loose, however, and the convey-ance rolled over and over for a distance of fifty feet down the steep declevity until the bottom was reached. Although it looked as if all would be dashed to pieces, it was found when roll was called that no serious damage had been done. This morning, while Mr. and Mrs. Lightfoot are suffering from numerous scratches and bruises, and the baby from a severe cut in its foot, they are so thankful for their providential escape that they have no complaints to make, and think that in a few days all will be entirely over the effects of the terrible ordeal.

PLEASANT GROVE. JUBILEE CELEBRATION.

Pioneer Day and Fiftieth Anniversary Of the Founding of Battle Creek. Special Correspondence,

Pleasant Grove, Utah, July 24 .- Fifty years ago today the people living along from American Fork to Provo Bench celebrated Pioneer day by making a grand rush to build a fort to protect themselves against Chief Walker and his band of Utes. The town of Pleasant Grove is the outgrowth of the fort then laid out and built.
Today Pleasant Grove and its two

daughters, Lindon and Manila, joined and celebrated the event right royally. There was a general gathering of old timers, some 50 or more of those who have lived in these wards for half a century being present. On the stand also were two of the original pioneers. Henson Walker and John S. Gleason. Sister Patience Archer, a hand cart vet-eran, was also present, as well as many more veterans from nearby towns. Be sides all these the fathers and mothers of the town that have passed away were represented, the pavilion being covered with their pictures.

The celebration opened with a parade, the best ever seen in Pleasant Grove. It was headed by the martial band;

among the drummers were Wm. M. Frampton, Thos. Bacon and Samuel Parks, men who were taught to drum by Maj. Duzette. Following this, was the Indian float, the log cabin, built by A. N.
