MINING STOCKS CONTINUE WEAK.

Local Market Acts in Sympathy With Eastern Situation.

MONTH'S RECORD VERY GOOD

Business Transacted Involved 1,576,017 Shares and \$1,002,672—Big Improvement Over August.

With the session of the mining exchange this morning another month's business in Utah mining stocks was brought to a close. During the month a big improvement in business was recorded and transactions involved no fewer than 1,576,017 shares and \$1,002,672, as compared with 1,325,452 shares and \$750,588, in August.

Not only was there much increase in the volume of trading recorded but stocks generally were more active. Many issues participated and the tendency of prices was upward, although money stringency in eastern financial circles lately has had an adverse effect on the local market.

September, however, closes with conditions at the various mining camps favorable to better prices and heavier trading on the exchange while it is confidently expected by the larger brokers that the money situation in the east will soon change for the better.

A MAMMOTH LEAD COMBINATION.

New York, Sept. 29.—The Herald tomorrow will say: Plans were practically concluded yesterday for the formation of a mammoth lead combination, which will include all the important lead manufacturing concerns in the country. Its capital will be at least \$50,000,000, and the plans for financing the deal have been satisfactorily arranged. It is expected that interests identified with the American Smelting & Refining company, the Morton Trust company and the National Lead company will be the concerns which will supply the necessary cash.

The scope of the new combination will include manufacturers of sheet, pipe and shot lead and white lead corrodors. In addition the American Smelting & Refining company, which is the largest producer of pig lead in the country, will also be largely interested as a stockholder. The directors will be chosen from the present board of directors of the National Lead company, the American Smelting & Refining company and the Union Lead & Oil company.

Some of the more important concerns which will be taken into the new combination are the Union Lead & Oil company, American Shot & Lead company, Latham Brothers & Co. of New York and Philadelphia, Boston Chadwick Lead company, Raymond Lead company, Chicago, Kahn Brothers & Co., New York; Hoyt Metal company, St. Louis; Markle Lead company, St. Louis; Gibson Price company, Cleveland; Blatchford Lead company, Chicago; Robinson Lead company, Dayton, O.; Mathieson Lead company, Brooklyn.
