LOCAL BRIEFS.

**Mckean Post Campfire**—The J. B. Mckean W. R. C. will hold its regular meeting at 2:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon in its rooms in the I. O. O. F. temple. The Mckean post and corps will give a campfire in their hall Saturday evening.

**Meeting of Brothers**—C. Moohle of 7 Dubel avenue was called yesterday, to his door by the bell, and on opening it, met a brother, P. Moehle, mayor of Okawville, Ill., whom he had not seen for 20 years. An impromptu reunion followed.

**Bodies Shipped**—The bodies of T. B. O'Reilly and J. J. O'Reilly were disinterred at St. Oliver yesterday and shipped to Ontario, Canada, for final interment in the local family plot. The O'Reillys were formerly well known business men on Main street.

**Sorenson Arrested**—John Sorenson has been arrested upon a complaint charging him with failing to support his two children. Mrs. Sorenson swore to the complaint yesterday before Judge Whitaker of the city court. She alleges that her husband has failed to provide for the children ever since Feb. 1, 1904.

**Miss Hayward Successful**—Miss Jean Hayward, a high school graduate of last year, has successfully passed the German examination before the city board of examiners. She is said to be the first person in the state to pass such an examination without first going abroad.

**Waterloo School Opened**—The Waterloo school opened yesterday, with Miss Grace Frost as principal, the delay having been occasioned by the failure of the county authorities to turn the school over to the city late time for opening simultaneously with the rest.

**Seniors Organized**—The high school seniors organized yesterday afternoon, with Roy Coates, president; Benare Grant, vice president; Margaret Park, secretary; and William Holmes, treasurer. Hal White editor of Red and Black. The staff of Red and Black will be chosen today.

**To Build New Church**—Architects Ware & Treganza are completing plans for an \$8,000 Presbyterian church to be erected at Green River, Utah. The edifice is 40x48 feet, so arranged that the site can be increased one-half, and the style is after that of English cathedral architecture. The seating capacity will be 200 people, and the walls will be of yellow brick. Excavation has already been commenced.

**Officers at Varsity**—The senior class of the state university elected these officers for the academic year, yesterday afternoon: Mehrtens Earley, president; C. Young, secretary and treasurer; executive committee, Hazel Stephens, Fred Bennion and Charles Gebbs. A meeting of the freshmen, '07 and fourth year normals has been called for this afternoon to elect officers.

**Cranberry Crop**—Now that cranberries are in the market, it may be locally interesting to note that they come mostly from the town of Wareham, "down on the cape," and the estimate of this year's crop is 200,000 to 230,000 barrels. There is a keen competition this season among buyers, as the American Cranberry company which handled the crop last year, is not holding down the boards this year. In the future, prices are falling, and the western markets ought to receive some benefit therefrom.

**Bad Blaze Prevented**—But for the prompt action of Miss Cecelia Sharp there might have been a serious blaze in the Constitution block late yesterday afternoon. Miss Sharp has a music studio in the building, and a lighted alcohol lamp was accidentally upset in the room. Immediately the curtains were ablaze, but Miss Sharp threw them from their hangings and trampled out the fire. The department was informed of the occurrence, but at the same time told that the presence of fire fighters would not be necessary.

**New Collection Method**—For a board bill alleged to be due but settlement not forthcoming, an Italian named Joe Partello was given severe beating by a daughter of sunny Italy yesterday afternoon. The occurrence took place in the corridor of the police station, after the woman, Mrs. Fosselli, had made a futile attempt to cause the arrest of Partello. She first sought refuge in Justice of the Peace Dan F. Smith's court, and failing there, went to police headquarters, Partello following meekly at her command. She was informed by the desk sergeant that the minions of the law could not help her in the case against the delinquent, and immediately thereafter the woman determined to take the law into her own hands. Partello was knocked down in the hallway by the angry landlady and then scratched and beaten. The two were arrested for fighting and put under \$10 bonds for appearance today.

JUDGE HOWELL WINS.

Supreme Court Renders an Opinion in His Favor.

The supreme court has handed down an opinion affirming the judgment of the lower court in the election contest case of Daniel Hamer, contestant and appellant, vs. Judge J. A. Howell of the Second district court. The contest was filed on behalf of Judge H. K. Rolapp, the Democratic nominee for the office, and was heard by Judge Charles W. Morse of this city. Judge Morse decided that Judge Howell was legally elected to the office, and was duly qualified to hold the position. An appeal was then taken to the supreme court.

The opinion of that court, which was written by Justice McCarthy and concurred in by Chief Justice Baruch and Justice Tamm, holds that there was no evidence of fraud, bribery or undue influence used by Judge Howell to secure his election and hence the lower court did not err in deciding that he was legally elected.

WOMAN BECAME DESPERATE.

Lost Her Money and Tried to Commit Suicide.

Marie Blakely, a resident of Commercial street, endeavored to end her life yesterday afternoon because she had lost a considerable sum of money. A purse containing \$80, several pawn tickets for diamonds "in soak" and some letters disappeared, and when she failed to find them, the girl secured a revolver and would have shot herself had friends not prevented the intended act. It was supposed that the colored housekeeper had committed the theft and that person, with Marie Burton, companion of the would-be suicide, and two male frequenters of the place, Ed Henderson and Steve Shurliff, was taken into custody. Later in the day, while searching the Blakely woman's room, Officer Carlson found the purse among some rubbish in an unused stove, and the articles were given into the possession of the owner. The two women who had been arrested were released, but Henderson and Shurliff were detained on a charge of vagrancy, and will doubtless be sent out of town.

STOCKHOLDERS' MEETINGS.

NORTH JORDAN IRRIGATION COMPANY.
