MADRID, 1. — The number of new cases of cholera throughout Spain yes-terday was 20,491, deaths 349. In the city of Madrid, 23 new cases have been reported to-day, and in the province of Madrid, outside of the city, 40 new researe and 14 deaths cases and 14 deaths.
