Between two and three o'clock in the afternoon the ship seemed to shiver from bows to stern, and appeared for an instant to staud still, as if beld in the grasp of an unseen power. In a moment she dashed forward and was beyond the radius of the cyclone, through which she passed without damage to herself or any of the 800 souls ou board.
