CALHOUN'S CASE GETS INTERESTING

Detective Burns, Armed With Search Warrant, Breaks Into Office and Safe. 1 marine

WAS SEARCHING FOR PAPERS

Employe of Burns Breaks Down, Confesses and Tells of Working for the Defense.

San Francisco, March 28 .- Following the sensational developments in the bribery-graft cases yesterday, brought about by the arrest of three United Railroad officials and five other persons in connection with the alleged thaft of jury lists, data concerning veniremen and similar papers from the office of the district attorney and that of William J. Burns, who heads the de-tective force of the prosecution, Frank J. Murphy, associate counsel for Abra-ham Ruor during the trial of the for-mer political boss, was taken into cus-tody today.

BURNS' STATEMENT.

According to the statement made by Burns, he had suspected that some one in his employ was receiving money from the defense in the Calhoun case and other cases arising out of the bribery charge in connection with the overhead trolley franchise. Burns raid that he finally became convinced that

overhead trolley franchise. Burns said that he finally became convinced that Hamilu, his secretary, had been ap-proached in a roundabount way, and he was in receipt of \$200 a month from incee persons, for which he had been systematically betraying the secrets of the prosecution to the defense. Maving satisfied himself as to these, Burns placed Hamilin, McKinley, Cor-bin, Van Wormer and Platt under ar-rest. He states that Hamilin, Corbin and Platt confessed, and he secured search warrants, by virtue of which his men entered the railroad offices and Luther Brown's office and went through all papers they found. James Hanley, the Burns men refused to recognize the injunction and continued the search.

CALHOUN'S SUITE SEARCHED. San Francisco, March 27.—Armed with a search warrant and backed by a dozon special officers, 10 or more police detectives and a score of patrol-men, heade dby Detective Sergeant Thomas Murphy and Asst. Dist. Atty. Thomas Tarrison, broke into the office of aPtrick Calboun, president of the United Railroads, late tonight and searched every nook and cranny in the suite which is occupied by Calboun and the legal forces of the company. The warrant was served by Murphy on Earl Rogers, counsel for Calboun in the bribery trial now before Judge Lawlor, Rogers stepped out into the hall, and, after scanning the paper, said that it was not of sufficient pow-er to allow the search. Others of the attorneys in the room say that he told Murphy that if he wound enter with one or two efficers be would permit him to search the offices. CALHOUN'S STATEMENT.

Mr. Calhoun made a statement to newspaper men tonight, in which he said:

"You have been, gentlemen, witness-es of one of the most significant out-rages ever committed on the Ameri-can continent. Under our Constitu-tion and as a part of the fundamental basis of American liberty, every man is protocted against the unlawful search and sciance of his papers. "Yesterday afternoon was a legal holiday. I was absent from the city, Witham J. Burns took this opportunity, by swearing out a bogus compilaint, to seize upon the offices of the United rallroads and make a search of its pa-pers and records." Calling attention to the fact that he had protested a number of times

had protested a number of times against looking at papers which from their headings bore evidence that they could never have been in possession of Burns and that one of the searchers replied that they were looking for a signature to a telegram, Calhoun con-tioned:

"This could not under any stretch of law have been within the purview of a search warrant made avowedly for a search warrant made avowedly for the purpose of securing papers belong-ing to Burns. The evident purpose of this search warrant was not to obtain pupers belonging to Burns. It was a fishing expedition for the purpose of looking into the private affairs of the United Railroads, and, if possible, gathering from the flex some evidence to support their alleged charges of brilery against me. against me "This sourch and the manner of its
