

LEGAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**THEATRICAL.**—The crowded house yesterday evening was a most flattering demonstration of the popularity of Madame Scheller, who played the part of "Zoe" in a truly artistic manner. **TENTH WARD CO-OPERATION.**—A co-operative association has been formed in the Tenth Ward, for the purpose of opening a ward store. Bishop John Proctor was elected President; William Ashman, Vice-President; Adam Spears, Treasurer; William Fuller, Secretary; and James Phillips, George Badley, and Abraham Hillman, Directors. Shares are placed at \$20 each, and \$10 was subscribed at the first meeting. This is another evidence of the energy and progress so characteristic of the Tenth Ward.

**ROAD COURTESY.**—A day or two ago as a wagon was going down the state road, having some ladies and children in it, a team coming up occupied the centre of the road where it is narrow, and did not move out of its track, forcing the other team into danger from the slough at the side of the road. Common courtesy demands something different from this; and where individuals driving teams do not have sufficient good manners, it is well for them to know that they are liable for any damage which may result from their carelessness and amenability to the law should injury be done.

**COMMITTED FOR TRIAL.**—William Foster, charged with the killing of O'Brien, hospital steward at Camp Douglas, on Friday night last, underwent an examination to day before Judge Hoge, in the U. S. court room. Some fourteen or fifteen witnesses were examined and the prisoner was committed to stand his trial at the next regular term; and was handed over to the custody of the Territorial Marshal, by whom he was confined in the county prison.

**ST. GEORGE.**—Br. Richard Bentley, from St. George, arrived on Saturday to purchase a stock of goods for that city. He left on the 27th ult., and informs us that the winter had been very mild and pleasant, and the roads were dry and dusty to Beaver. The people of that region were enjoying general good health, with the exception of some cases of scarlet fever in Pine Valley. Reports from the missionaries on the Muddy were favorable. The brethren there are taking the right course to make a good country of their location. In St. George buildings and improvements are being pushed ahead. The people were busy putting in their wheat. The Fall wheat was eaten up by a late hatching of grasshoppers, and those who had lost it were re-sowing. The "iron-clads" had, however, succumbed to the winter weather, and had died, there being no warm sun to revive them when they got benumbed and desiccated with the cold.

The people are feeling well and enjoying themselves.

LEGISLATIVE.

**HOUSE.**—House met at 10 a.m. The Grantsville City Library Charter was reported upon favorably, and the bill passed; and was ordered sent to the Council for their action.

The Judiciary Committee reported back C.F. 5, entitled "An act to provide for mechanics and laborers' lien." Tabled.

The Committee on Roads, &c., reported that they had examined the Territorial road Commissioner's report and recommended that the following sums of money be inserted in the Territorial appropriation bill: \$887, to defray expenses incurred in repairing the bridge between Junab and Millard Counties, on the Sevier river; \$3,000, to be expended on the State Road in S. L. County, running South; and \$3,475.40 to defray expenses already incurred in repairs on the Weber river bridge, in Weber Co. The report was accepted and the Committee on Claims, &c., instructed accordingly.

The financial report of Cache county was presented by Mr. Maughan; read and referred to Committee on Revenue.

The Committee on Revenue reported that the respective sums of \$620 and \$8,363, were credited on the Treasurers' books to the school fund and incidentals.

The Committee on Revision to whom was referred communication of J. S. Gyles reported that they deemed it inexpedient to legislate thereon; adopted.

A bill to amend an Act incorporating the University of the State of Deseret was presented by Mr. Rowberry; read and referred to Committee on Education.

On motion of Mr. Thurber a committee was appointed to examine the Auditor's and Treasurer's books and redempted auditors' warrants and if found correct to destroy said warrants. Messrs. Thurber, Reese, and Wright were appointed said committee.

Mr. Wm. R. Smith presented a bill for "An act pertaining to damage done by animals, and for other purposes," read and referred to committee of Agriculture, Trade, &c.

Mr. Wright presented financial report of Box Elder county, which was read and referred to the committee on Revenue.

Mr. Rowberry moved that the committee on claims and appropriations be instructed to insert in the Territorial appropriation bill the sum of \$2,500, to be expended under the direction of the Territorial Road Commissioner on the Territorial road running west from Jordan bridge to Black Rock in Salt Lake county; referred to the committee on Roads, &c.
