

RUEF TELLS ABOUT IMMUNITY PROMISE

Former Political Boss Declares Everyone Offered to Protect Him.

EVEN BURNS AND BIGGY

Hene's Secret Service Man and Elisor Said They Would Kill Man Who Broke Faith.

San Francisco, Feb. 14.—A lengthy affidavit by Abraham Ruef disclosing considerable of the history of the now famous immunity contract and the alleged pressure brought upon Ruef to induce him "to tell all he knew" was read by Henry Ach, chief counsel for the former political boss in the superior court this morning before Judge Lawlor. The affidavit was supplemented by one made by Ruef last week. It relates how pressure was brought upon him by the prosecution through his mother, father, and sister and the Rev. Jacob Nieto and Rev. Bernard Kaplan, all of whom beside Dist. Atty. Langdon, Francis J. Hene and Special Agent W. J. Burns urged him to testify before the grand jury. "For the good of the community," the affidavit said, Ruef finally, upon the most positive assurances and guarantee of immunity and the permission to withdraw his plea of guilty, went before the grand jury and testified. Ruef alleges in his affidavit that Special Agent Burns and Elisor W. J. Biggy, went so far in their assertions to assure him that the prosecution would carry out its agreement, that they declared they would kill anyone a party to the contract who would violate any part of the agreement.

FROM RUEF'S FATHER.

Affidavits by Ruef's father and sister were also read. They substantiated and corroborated Ruef in his statements that the prosecution had urged them to get Ruef to tell all he knew, and that the most positive and solemn assurances were given them that if he would do so, that he would be given full immunity and not be prosecuted on any of the matters at hand. The reading of these affidavits by his attorneys, state Senator George B. Keane and Richard O'Connor, was preceded by Henry Ach calling the attention of the court to the reports made by some of the persons whose names were drawn for the jury box, that they had been approached by some alleged private detectives who sought to get their views on the graft prosecution. "So far as the defendant in this case is concerned," said Ach, "we want to assure the court that not a single person other than his counsel is being employed in any capacity." He suggested, however, that the court take some action.

This brought forth a statement from Asst. Dist. Atty. O'Garra and it was reported that persons approaching prospective jurors declared themselves to be agents of the district attorney's office and Dist. Atty. Langdon authorized the statement that no one had been given authority to represent his office in approaching the persons who had complained.

After absenting himself from the bench a few minutes, Judge Lawlor returned and stated it was the view of the court that both sides were entitled to learn all about the personnel of the jury panel, but warned them that no one must speak to any member of it in regard to their views on this case and ordered that any such act be reported to him. At 12:30 court took a recess until 2 o'clock when argument will begin. As yet the prosecution has made no counter showing.

DUNNE AND MURPHY MIX.

San Francisco, Feb. 14.—Superior Judge Frank H. Dunne, when approached for an affidavit about what transpired at the alleged midnight meeting when, it is said, he gave his assurances that he would allow Ruef to withdraw his plea of guilty today ordered Frank J. Murphy, associate counsel for Ruef, from his chambers. The incident occurred just after the adjournment of Judge Lawlor's court, according to Murphy's statement, he went into Judge Dunne's chamber for an affidavit, and was told "to get out." According to Murphy, Judge Dunne declared that he would make an affidavit of what transpired between himself and Judge Dunne and file it with Judge Lawlor.

Prince of India With Royal Entourage Arrives in San Francisco.

San Francisco, Feb. 14.—The prince of India, His Highness Nawab Sultan-ul-Mulk Bahadur of Hyderabad, and his royal entourage, arrived in San Francisco this morning on the Pacific Mail liner Korea, after a tour of several months in Japan. His visit to the orient was made chiefly for the purpose of regaining his health and at the present time he is enroute to Eng-

land to consult a number of eminent specialists in the hope of effecting a permanent cure of his illness.
The prince is the only heir of the Nizam of Hyderabad, and with the death of the ruler would come into a dominion almost as large as France, although not quite as rich as the latter country.
