HAND MADE BLOUSE.

In this smart hand-made blouse the usual course of trimming procedure is reversed, the all-over lace part being posed just above the belt, while the lucking and insertions take the place of the usual yoke. The lace is rather an odd pattern in Russian gulpure, and the yoke of tucking, which is cross-barred with this entre-deux, extends to the bust line.

The remainder of the blouse is an all-over imitation of Irish crochet; and the fastening is in the back, two groups of tucks running parallel with the concealed fastening. The sleeve is full at the top, and puffed sections are separated by bandings of the guipure, a cuff of this latter making a smart finish at the wrist. The collar is likewise of the same gulpure, and is sustained in shape by the familiar little rods of flexible featherbone.
