MORE STREET PAVING.
Improvement to be Extended Down East South Temple—The Cost.

Estimates of the cost of paving south East Temple street from Fourth to Ninth South streets have been prepared by City Engineer Ritter. The block between Fordham and Fifth South streets will cost \$11 per foot from end and the remainder of the street will cost \$3.55 per foot front. The city's portion of the cost for paving fifth street will be \$28,878. The petition for paving the first street was signed by J. H. Walker, M. H. Walker, Mrs. A. E. Walker, J. W. Houston, the Houston Real Estate Investment company and a number of other property owners. Between Fourth and Fifth South streets the street will be paved its full width, but below Fifth South it will be narrowed to 52 feet, and the side-walks will be widened on each side accordingly.

BANK STATEMENT SHOWS A DECREASE

Changed Condition Due to the Wells Fargo Retirement.

BUSINESS AS IT REALLY IS.

Resources of State Banks, Both Private and Corporate, Amount to \$20,198,553 51.

A recapitulation of the statements of the 35 private and corporate banks in the state at the close of business on March 14 and May 29, filed with Secretary of State Tingey, shows a decrease in resources of \$26,481,523.72, all of which is due to the suspension of business of the Wells Fargo & Co. bank. That bank always filed a statement of the business of all its branches and did not segregate its Salt Lake bank from its others, hence the bank statements hereon are all general, however, excepting that the decrease of resources as shown by the last statement does not indicate any great loss in that respect.
