

## CZAR NICHOLAS TO HIS SUBJECTS.

In a "Supreme Manifesto" He  
Tells Them What He Did to  
Preserve Peace.

### JAPAN WAS VERY PEREMPTORY

Asks God's Blessings Upon "Our  
Stalwart Land and Naval  
Forces."

St. Petersburg, Feb. 10.—The Official Messenger this morning contains the following "supreme manifesto":  
"By the grace of God, we, Nicholas III, emperor and autocrat of all the Russias, etc., make known to all our loyal subjects:

"In our solicitude for the maintenance of peace, which is dear to our hearts, we made every exertion to continue tranquility in the far east. In these peaceful aims we signified assent to the proposals of the Japanese government to revise agreements regarding Korean affairs existing between the two governments. However, the negotiations begun upon the subject were not brought to a conclusion, and Japan without awaiting the receipt of the last responsive proposals of our government, declared the negotiations broken off and diplomatic relations with Russia dissolved.

"Without advising us of the fact that the breach of such relations would in itself mean an opening of warlike operations, the Japanese government gave orders to its torpedo boats to suddenly attack our squadron standing in the outer harbor of the fortress of Port Arthur. Upon receiving reports from the victory in the far east about this, we immediately commanded him to answer the Japanese challenge with armed force.

"Making known this our decision, we, with unshaken faith in the Almighty and with a firm expectation of and reliance upon the unanimous willingness of all our loyal subjects to stand with us in defense of the fatherland, ask God's blessing upon our stalwart land and naval forces.

"Given at St. Petersburg, Jan. 27, 1904, A. D. (new calendar, Feb. 9, 1904) and in the 10th year of our reign. Written in full by the hand of the Emperor."

SCENE AT WINTER PALACE.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 9.—There was an unprecedented scene at the religious service held in the winter palace at 4 o'clock this afternoon. At the command of the czar, a great concourse of ministers, court officials, high state functionaries, ladies of rank and military men assembled in St. George's hall all the men arrayed in full uniform. After some delay, which became oppressive because of the fogging of solemnity plainly apparent, the doors of the imperial apartments were opened and the czar entered, wearing the uniform of the First Guard regiment of Russia, with the dagger-carabina on his arm.

The dowager wore a costume of pearl grey and no jewels. The young czarina, wearing her favorite white and silver frock, escorted by the Grand Duke Michael and her presumptive. The entire imperial family followed, in order of precedence. Approaching a group of naval and military officers, his majesty turned gravely and greeted them with the customary Russian phrase, "I wish you good health, gentlemen."

The officers responded with loud acclamations, shouting victorious hurrahs. The scene became one of wild enthusiasm, and moved forward, entering the chapel, advanced to the altar and stood with bowed heads while the choir and clergy intoned an impressive introductory service of the Greek church. An intensely religious spirit pervaded the entire assemblage, which crowded the little palace to its utmost capacity. During the recital of the many knelt, and even bowed their heads in the chapel floor.

The court chaplain attended by the deacon, reverently approached the czar and sprinkled him with holy water from the chalice and presented a crucifix, which the czar kissed fervently. At the conclusion of the service the

#### SURGEON NEWTON.

Ordered to Proceed to Price  
And Report.

Washington, Feb. 9.—Contract Surgeon Ralph W. Newton, U. S. A., now at Barre, Vt., has been ordered to proceed to Price, Utah, in time to arrive at the latter place not later than Feb. 20, and report in person to the commanding officer of the companies of the Twelfth infantry to arrive from Fort DuChesne Utah, for duty with that regiment en route to the Philippine Islands.

Mr. John S. Mallory has been transferred from the First to the Twelfth infantry, and Maj. George Bell, Jr., from the Twelfth to the First infantry.

#### THE MACHEN CASE.

Defendant Tells His Side of the  
Story.

Washington, Feb. 9.—The fifth, and what is now considered to be the last week of the postal trial, began today. August W. Machen, former superintendent of the rural free delivery division of the postoffice department and the central figure in the case, testified.

Mr. Machen said he came to Washington and assumed his duties as assistant superintendent of free delivery in May, 1903. He then gave a summary of his oil transactions and the selling of his interest in the oil business to Lorenz.

Mr. Machen admitted that some times he resorted to "kiting." When he wanted money in a hurry, he testified, he would draw on Lorenz. He declared he had no financial interest whatever in the oil properties after receiving a \$25,000 note from Lorenz. Mr. Machen said he always took the position of encouraging the testing with the view of the ultimate adoption of any device or system which tended to the betterment of the free delivery system and the convenience of the public. It was impossible, he said, to give personal attention to the ordinary details of the service, and after 1900 he personally examined very little mail.

Mr. Machen assumed all the responsibility for the acts of his chief clerk, Miss Lieberhardt, saying: "While I am convinced by Miss Lieberhardt, I have always assumed the responsibility for every signature and every initial she has made."

After a brief pause Mr. Machen admitted: "I sent it by today."

Miss Lieberhardt, he said, indicated probably in per cent of the orders for draft fastenings.

Mr. Machen said that the rule of the department was to allow an investigator to present something resembling a test his device at his own expense. This was done, he said, in Druff's case. Mr. Machen explained the introduction of the fastener in Washington, and said: "I have the schedule that would secure

Continuing, Mr. Machen said he brought the matter personally to the attention of First Assistant Postmaster-General Jones, and pointed out the advantages to be gained by the use of the device. Had there been any attempt of concealment or sliding in this, the first order, Washington would not have been selected.

#### Senator Cullom on Panama.

Washington, Feb. 9.—In the executive session of the senate today the Panama canal treaty was taken up for formal consideration, and Senator Cullom, chairman of the committee on foreign relations, who has charge of the treaty, made a formal statement in explanation of its terms and in advocacy of its ratification. His speech was written, and was a careful analysis of the articles of the agreement. He explained in some detail the points in which this treaty differs from the Hay-Herran treaty with Colombia, contending that the present agreement was far superior to the former one, in that it practically places the United States in absolute control of the canal and the isthmus. ## SAN DOMINGO'S TIME HAS COME.

United States Will Take Drastic  
Measures to End Anarchy  
In the Islands.

### NAVY WILL HANDLE THE CASE.

Washington Officials Are Convinced  
That Affairs Can Be Best Im-  
proved by Force.

Washington, Feb. 9.—Drastic measures will be taken by this government to end the anarchy in San Domingo. Continued violation of international law, the destruction of American property and disregard of foreign interests has convinced officials that affairs there can be best improved by force. Its handling has been turned over to the navy and Recy, Moody is sending tonight supplementary instructions to Rear-Admiral Wise, commanding the training squadron now in Domingan waters, giving him wide latitude in the course he is to follow. Rear-Admiral Wise has been told, in a word, to protect by force American interests and to deal with each case on its own merits. The reports received from the island show, as an official expressed it tonight, that the condition of affairs there is "semi-barbaric."

The question was one of the features of the cabinet meeting today, and at the close of the discussion it was decided the best solution of the problem was to turn affairs over to the navy and have Admiral Wise insure the absolute protection of American interests. It is believed here that he already has taken steps to obtain apology and full reparation for the firing on the New York.

#### THE DIXIE STARTS.

San Juan, P. R., Feb. 9.—The United States auxiliary cruiser Dixie took leave here and sailed on rush orders to San Domingo this afternoon. It is reported here that the cruisers Montomery and Detroit, now at Culebra, have been ordered from there to Porto Plata, AMERICAN LIGHTERS FIRED ON.

Monte Christi, Republic of San Domingo, Saturday, Feb. 6.—The Clyde line steamer New York from New York, Jan. 30, arrived here this morning, followed by the Domingan gunboat Presidente. Lighters were sent alongside the New York to bring ashore some ammunition which formed part of her cargo. When the lighters had nearly reached the steamer, the gunboat fired on them and the revolutionists on shore replied with cannon and mausers. The New York, being in danger, thereupon left Monte Christi for Porto Plata. The firing continued for half an hour, after which the gunboat sailed for Porto Plata. She was hit twice by rounds, and apparently by hundreds of bullets, for she shot back lowered boats, evidently to plug up the holes made in her hull. The failure to land the ammunition is a serious blow to Gen. Jimenez, for whom it was intended and may cause him to lose the ground he had already gained. An attack on Santiago de Los Caballeros has been fixed for Saturday. The German steamer Altonburg was here on Monday. The revolutionists did not permit her to discharge cargo at this point.

#### CHEERS FOR PRINCIPAL.

But the Students Only Had Jeers  
For the Faculty.

Chicago, Feb. 10.—A dispatch to the Tribune from Racine, Wis., says: With cheers for the deposed principal of the Danish Lutheran college, and jeers for the faculty, 50 of the students have left the college with the principal. With them were the cooks, janitors and all employees, and they will not return until Snow Nielson, the principal, again takes charge of the Danish college.

A dispute between Principal Nielson and the Rev. C. H. Jensen, president of the college directorate, over the expelling of students because of smoking and the demand that the principal turn over all books and accounts, led to the college after the directorate had accepted his resignation, to take effect March 5, became known to students. Learning that Nielson had complied with the order, the students gathered and persuaded him to go with them to the college, where his reinstatement was demanded.

Nielson made an address which was cheered, and the students jeered the members of the faculty, and left the college. Two directors have tendered their resignations because of the president's action.

#### A Thousand Tons of China Silk.

Ogdensburg, N. Y., Feb. 10.—A special train of 18 cars, carrying 1,000 tons of China silk, valued at \$2,000,000, one of the largest single shipments on record, has arrived here today from Vancouver en route to New York.

#### WRECK ON THE SOO.

Already Fifteen Bodies Have Been  
Taken From It.

St. Paul, Feb. 9.—A dispatch to the Dispatch from Winnipeg, Man., says that 15 bodies have been taken from the wrecked Soo trains, and many others are seriously injured.

#### Erastus Wiman Dead.

New York, Feb. 9.—Erastus Wiman, who at one time was prominent in the development of Staten Island, and later sustained financial reverses, died tonight at his home at St. George, S. I. He suffered a stroke of paralysis three years ago and for the past year had been in an almost helpless condition.

#### Negro Politician Shot.

St. Louis, Feb. 9.—"Jim" Ray, one of the best known figures in the local sporting world, a leading negro politician, reputed to have been the wealthiest negro in St. Louis, was shot and killed in a pistol battle in which 30 shots were fired, as the result of a gambling quarrel. His partner, John Arthur, is lying from wounds received in the fight.

#### SCHAEFER MURDER CASE.

Bedford, Ind., Feb. 9.—James McDonald, the bomber whose testimony before the board of inquiry in the Bedford murder mystery was to the effect that he walked home in front of Miss Schaefer's house last night, and met two men standing in the corner of the alley where the murder occurred.

curled, has been arrested charged with the murder, and will be taken to Jeffersonville tonight.

Detective Reed's search of the alley Monday resulted in establishing the link in the chain of evidence necessary to make an arrest. Footprints of a man and woman were found. Several pickets of the fence near by were pulled loose from their fastenings, indicating that a struggle had taken place. The detectives made a plaster of paris cast of the footprints, and this will be exhibited in evidence against the accused. The motive of the crime was twofold, according to the detectives, robbery and assault. The latter was unsuccessful. McDonald testified before the court of inquiry that he passed Capt. J. D. Alexander and Miss Schaefer on L street a few minutes before her death, and overheard their conversation; also that he passed two men at the corner of the alley where the murder was committed.

#### Alaskan Boundary.

Washington, Feb. 9.—Senator Lodge has introduced a joint resolution directing the secretary of commerce and labor to inquire into the effect of the decision of the Alaskan boundary tribunal upon the Wales Island Packing company and report to Congress if it has suffered any damage or is unable to continue its business by being adjudged in British territory. The resolution has been referred to the committee on claims.

#### Montana Change of Venue Law.

Helena, Feb. 9.—The constitutionality of the general change of venue law is to be decided by the supreme court, which has issued an alternative writ directed to District Judge Clancy of Butte, restraining him from proceeding further with the hearing of testimony in a case before his court where the Boston & Montana company is accused of contempt of court. 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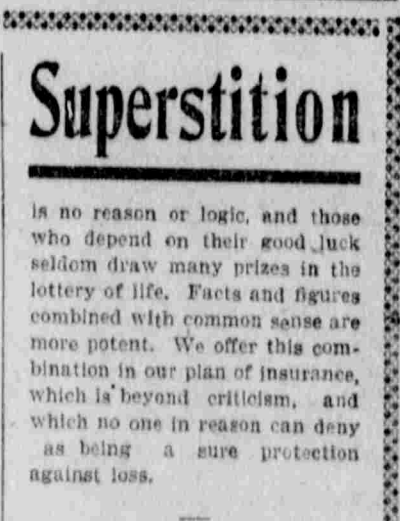
