Local and Other Matters.

An Enjoyable Time.—The 17th Ward Relief Society excursion to Lake Point, with sail on the *General Garfield*, yesterday, was enjoyed much by those who participated. The company was a large one, numbering between four and five hundred.

Theatre.—The Theatre was well filled last night, to witness the comedy of "Marriage" by Daly's Fifth Avenue Company from New York. This play rests on the adventures of a young American who makes "love" to women freely, and gets into divers scrapes in consequence, from which he escapes by his impudence, cheek, vivacity, fertility of resource, and similar characteristics. There is no model to the play, but there is considerable wit in it, and a number of funny scenes and situations.

The company is not a star company—it is a company of excellent artists, all possessing a good degree of ability, and all playing admirably to each other, which causes the play to go off in an exceedingly satisfactory manner. The audience appeared to be immensely pleased, and the applause and laughter at times, especially at the close of the second act, were roaring, reverberatory and irresistible.

After the play came the "Rough Diamond," with the family song of "When a Little Farm We Keep," which was encored. This farce was played with spirit and humor. But there are two things wherein it might be improved. The poor puppets and the poor business of "Joe" by "Margery" are not in very good taste. "Margery" is not correct "Joe" just as effectively by expending her wrath upon his Sunday school teacher and then upon his head. Next the rural population of England do not converse in the rapid style of the "Margery" and "Joe" of last night—they speak much more deliberately and distinctly in their way.
