Dr. Park concluded his remarks or Psychology. After a brief review of yesterday's talk, the Doctor went or to say that among the faculties of the mind enumerated by psychologists there remain yet two for our consideration—Reason and Judgment. These are so closely connected in their functions that they might well be treated under one head, or as different features of the same faculty. Reason, simply stated, is a comparison of facts; the cenclusion reculting from such a comparison is called Judgment. As reason brings to its aid, in making comparison, all the other faculties of the mind, and terminates in judgment, the judgment might be said to be a concentration of the energy, knowledge and experience of all the faculties of the mind, including reason. Reason may also be described as a process of drawing deductions from what is known, so as to establish a truth before unknown. Truth or faliacy may be the result of reasoning. We may reason from false premises and reason correctly, when the conclusions will be as certainly false as the initiative steps in the process. It comes within the province of logic rather than that of psychology to determine what is and what is not correct reasoning, with the view of establishing truth in the conclusions. The study of logic, therefore, is as strongly recommended to the consideration of the conscientious teacher as that of psychology.
